HOUSE OF REFUGE REPORT ACCEPTED

Chairman Munro Freed of Any Charge of Overcharging or the Like.

THE HOSPITAL ACCOUNT

Matter Held Over For Further Information-A New Bridge at Miggiesex.

At the meeting of the county council yesteruay afternoon the itemized state-ment prepared by Chairman Munro, of the house of Refuge Committee, was accepted by the county, and thus Mr. Muhro was Heed from any charge of overcharging or useless expenditure.

Mr. M. Accougan presented the annual statement of the nouse of Kefuge from Nov. 15, 1911, to the same time this year, and it stated that during the year there had been by dinerent inmates, who had remained for 20,370 days. At the beginning of the year had been 9 patients, and more had been admitted during the last twelve months. During the year 14 of the inmates had d.ed, 7 discharged, and 14 had left without notice, with the result that there are 50 inmates at the institution at present. The total cost of maintenance was \$11,604.77, which was 38.43 cents per day per member, without attendance, and 02.9 cents per days with attendance. The report also stated that 43 of the inmates were there on account of being without homes, 17 because of weak intellect, 15 through intemperance, 3 were suffering from paralvsis, 3 were cripples, 2 were blind, I was deaf and dumb, and the remaining one is a sufferer from rheumatism. Victoria Hospital Account.

The account of Victoria Hospital was presented, but was laid on the table until the advice of the county solicitor was obtained as to wether the county had to pay for some of the patients or not. The account for the year amounted to \$3,468, and the balance due is


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
