TWO NEW CRUISERS FOR PACIFIC COAST

Present Ones Are Too Slow to Cope With the American Poachers.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, July 22.—Tenders will be called for shortly by the marine department for two new fisheries protection cruisers for the Pacific coast. The cruisers Kestrel and Newington, now on the coast, are slow and out of date,

and unable to cope effectively with the American poachers. The new cruisers will cost about \$100,000 each. The public works department is also calling for tenders for extensive harbor improvements at Victoria, B.C., including new docks and dredging. The plans call for a total expenditure of about two million dollars within the next two years.
