Bulletin From Bedside at Tokio
Shows Conditions Much
More Hopeful.

Tokio, July 22. — The condition of the Emperor of Japan has been improving during the day. A bulletin is issued at 5 o'clock this evening says: "Temperature, 100 degrees Fahrenheit; pulse, 88; respiration, 25. Digestion good."

TWO NEW CRUISERS FOR PACIFIC COAST

Present Ones Are Too Slow
Cope With the American
Poachers.

Ottawa, July 22.—Tenders will
be called for shortly by the marine de-
partment for two new fisheries pro-
tection cruisers for the Pacific coast. The
cruisers Kestrel and Newington, now
on the coast, are slow and out of date
and unable to cope effectively with
American poachers. The new cruisers
will cost about \$100,000 each.

The public works department is al-
ready calling for tenders for the im-
provements at Victoria, B.C., includ-
ing new docks and dredging. The plan
call for a total expenditure of about
two million dollars within the next
two years.
