However, the bankers say differently. They claim that, as in practically every case the day that the rafts fall due is later than April 15,

the stamps must go on. This means that as the drafts fall due the various wholesalers and jobbers will lose their two cents on each one. Stamp taxes for all negotiable paper is going to be a rather large figure for nany of the large city firms. Some of these draw as many as 100 drafts daily in some cases more. This means, say, \$2.00 per day to each firm, or well over \$700 per year for stamps alone. Add to Prices.
