

THOMAS SEES CRASH UNLESS BRITISH WORK ONE QUARTER HARDER

London, Feb. 9.—(By Canadian Press).—J. H. Thomas, railway workers' leader, says that the state of the world is such that unless something is done speedily a crash will come when nobody will suffer more than the workmen. He says that the British workmen must work a quarter harder than before the war, the French twice harder, and the Germans eighteen times harder. Mr. Thomas adds that the Labor party's difficulties arise not because of other parties being cleverer, but through the damnable jealousies in its own ranks.

INQUIRE FOR SAFETY OF CANADIAN TRADE OFFICIAL IN SIBERIA

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—Inquiries are being made as to the safety of H. R. Pousette, acting Canadian trade commissioner at Vladivostok, Siberia. With the recent advances of Bolshevik forces there is naturally some apprehension. No official word has been received from Mr. Pousette for some time. But this, it is thought, may be due to difficulties of communication.

Spent Thousands; Found No Millions

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—(By Canadian Press).—State department officials take issue with statements contained in a Toronto Globe editorial of Saturday last on "The Kaiser's Political Investments." In Alberta, and British Columbia, where it was stated, some millions of dollars worth of property were held by Alvo von Alvensleben, afterward rounded up as a spy. A high official of the department stated to the Canadian Press today that instead of Alvensleben having several million dollars worth of property tied up ready to hand the Canadian Government had spent some thousands of dollars to learn that this and other similar stories were in the nature of myth. Alvensleben, it was said, had lost money in investments in the west, but it was found that his interests in timber and mineral rights and other properties were really so small that there was practically nothing for the Government to seize.

C. P. R. DIVIDENDS.

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—At a meeting of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company the following dividends were declared: On preference stock, 2 per cent for the half-year ending December 31, 1919. On common stock, 2 1/2 per cent for the quarter ending December 31, 1919, being at the rate of 7 per cent per annum from revenue, and 3 per cent per annum from special income account. Both dividends are payable April 1, 1920, to stockholders of record at 3 p.m. March 1, 1920.

FLAME THROWERS AID IN CLEANING STREETS OF NEW YORK CITY

Traffic Is Suspended While
Novel Method Is Tried.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—More than 13,700 snowshovelers, 1,000 emergency trucks and a steam shovel made up the army which today forced a retreat of much of the snow and ice which has choked New York's streets for nearly a week. Two soldier flame throwers attacked several hundred square feet of snow in a test at 59th street and Central Park, but proved of little avail in the day's warfare.

All traffic, except of an emergency nature, was banished from numerous thoroughfares, while the battle with the snow continued, but by nightfall approximately normal conditions prevailed. With the exception of Manhattan "third rail" surface cars put out of business by clogged "slots" in the streets, trolley transportation was resumed generally.

Thousands of persons watched the unsuccessful attempts to melt the snow and ice in Central Park with flame throwers of the Lawrence type, which were successfully used against the Germans.

Bridge at Fort Erie Would Mark 100 Years' Peace

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—A delegation from Welland County interviewed Sir George Foster, acting premier, and members of the Government today to urge construction of an international bridge between Fort Erie and Buffalo. The bridge, it is proposed, would be constructed both to facilitate communication and mark the 100 years of peace between Great Britain and the United States. It would be known as the peace memorial bridge.

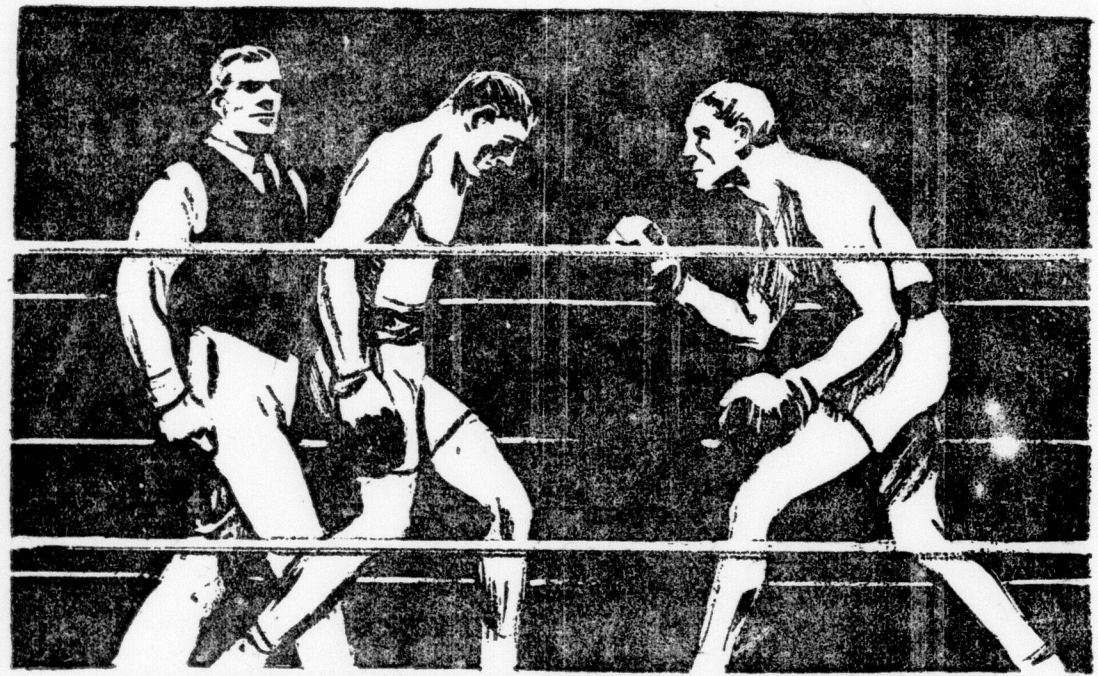
