Roscoe Troxler, known wherever horse racing is permitted as the "daddy of all Jockeys," has finally tossed the sponge into the ring and exchanged his riding "kit" for a trainer's split-second watch. Nearly a quarter of a century ago he "broke into" the riding game as a midget, weighing less than seventy pounds, get, weighing less than seventy pounds, and since that time has criss-crossed the American continent many, many times in pursuit of one of those fortunes so many followers of the racing game imagine every jockey amasses.

Troxler scored hundreds of thrilling records during his long career as a jockey, but the one he prizes the most was achieved away back in 1906 when he won both the Kentucky and Latonia derbies with the same horse. Only two

he won both the Kentucky and Latonia derbies with the same horse. Only two other race riders ever performed such a feat, Isaac Murphy scoring a "double" in 1891 aboard the great horse, Kingman, and E. Cimms, winning both races in 1896 with Ben Brush.

Space will not permit of a complete recapitulation of Troxler's saddle work during the past twenty years, but the really outstanding performances were as follows:


