**RAILWAYS MAY REPORT
SHOWS DEFICIT OF \$38,638**

President Hanna States Figures Include Whole Canadian National System.

TORONTO, June 29.—The Canadian National Railways report a deficit of \$38,638.96 for the month of May, apart from interest charges. Gross earnings were \$9,797,431.35 and operating expenses \$9,836,070.31. To

earn \$100, therefore, the company spent \$100.38. In May of last year \$129.87 was spent to earn \$100.

President Hanns said today: "The figures quoted are for the entire system, including the Canadian Northern, Intercolonial, Prince Edward Island, National Transcontinental and Grand Trunk Pacific railways.

"Operating expenses of these lines for the five months have been reduced

by nearly \$13,000,000 or by 20 per cent. The performance has only been made possible by the improved operating conditions which we have been able to bring about as the result of the wise expenditure of money in the last three years to remove factors of a limiting nature. The extension of heavier power over various sections of the line has been made possible and due to this and other

advances in operating efficiency a substantial advance in train load has been secured, so that we are beginning to compare very favorably with other lines, except in respect to the slim traffic that exists on various sections of the system."
