FOUR "MOUNTIES" COME TO GUARD INCOME RETURNS

Will Remain In Office To Protect Large Sums Expected.

OFFICIALS ARMED
Department Desirous of Forestalling Any Possible Holdups.

The scarlet of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will again be a familiar sight around London, when four picked "redcoats" arrive Monday to guard the hundreds of thousands of dollars that will be pouring into the London Branch of the income department during the rush period around the last of April.

The guard will be in charge of Sergeant Whistler of Windsor and will be stationed at strategic points in the office. Two or three officers will have a constant watch over the cashiers' windows, while the remainder will cover the entrance and exits to foil a getaway should a holdup be attempted.

The three mounties are being brought from Niagara Falls, Bridgeburg and Oswego, and their sojourn in the city will last about ten days. Should the rush period extend longer than is expected at present, however, the officers probably will be kept here until all the money has been transferred from the office to the banks.

Guard All Offices.
Local income tax officials do not expect by any means that a robbery will be attempted, but the amount of money that will pass through the head office of the London district during the next week or so would warrant an elaborate holdup and the department, knowing well that it has been tried before, are taking great precautions and every large office in the Dominion will be guarded during the period.

Last year a flurry of excitement swept through the offices in Western Ontario, when it was reported that a foreign-born woman had ripped in the bud a grandiose scheme for robbing the Hamilton office by warning the officials a day before the holdup was scheduled to be staged. The guard in Hamilton was doubled, but nothing happened.

Arm Officials.
Every precaution will be taken by the London officials to make a holdup in this city next to impossible. To make assurance doubly sure all responsible male officials will be armed and with four stalwart mounties in the office officials believe that it would be decidedly unhealthy, not to say dangerous, for any person or persons to try to steal any of the money accompanying the income tax returns.

All returns have to be in the office by April 30, and judging by the steady increase during the last week or so, officials are of the opinion that this year the number of "laggards" will be few. A heavy penalty is prescribed by law for failure to file income tax returns.

MAKE RONDEAU BAY ANGLERS' PARADISE

Erieau Asks Government To Re-stock Waters With Bass.

ASK PERMISSION TO GIVE CONCERTS IN PARK SUNDAYS

G.W.V.A. Requests Privilege From Utilities To Stage Entertainments.

BUCHANAN OBJECTS
Sarah Stevens Would Operate "Baby Aeroplane" At Springbank Park.

The advisability of permitting band concerts to be staged at Victoria and Queen's Parks during the summer months was briefly but interestingly discussed at the public utilities commission meeting yesterday afternoon.

The object has been gone into on former occasions, and at Thursday's session a request was read from the Great War Veterans' Association, asking that permission be granted them to hold Sunday concerts as has been the custom in London for many years.

Holds Similar Views.
It is a well-known fact that the Local Duty Alliance frowns on Sunday general manager of the public utilities announced that he entertained similar views and that to his way of thinking the holding of Sunday concerts was "on the thin edge of the wedge" of having motion picture shows on the Sabbath.

Commissioner Philip Peacock took the opposite view of the matter. He could see no harm in holding band concerts on Sunday nights, he declared, and in his opinion a band concert was elevating, whereas a movie was not.

Sarah Stevens wants to operate a whirling device at Springbank Park for children. She plans to build it near the miniature train and it will be known as a Baby Aeroplane. The request was referred to the parks board.

Mr. Buchanan announced that new transformers, weighing more than those which have been purchased before, were being constructed in the basement of sub-station No. 1. He pointed out that the work would be facilitated if a 15-ton chain block were purchased. It was decided to obtain the block at a cost of about \$550. Prices were submitted from eight firms.

Asked if the chain block was absolutely necessary, Mr. Buchanan replied, "No, but in cases of emergency such as the power going off about 3 o'clock when the daily papers are going to press, the block would serve a real purpose."

Wants Payment For Window.
The commission is in receipt of a bill of \$138.65 from the London Loan Company who claim that one of their plate glass windows was broken when a lineman dropped an insulator while at work. The company holds that the commission is liable for the damage. The matter was traversed for further consideration.

T. J. Hannigan of the Ontario Municipal Hydro-Electricity Commission has forwarded to the commission a copy of the resolutions adopted at the meeting held in Hamilton a few weeks ago. He asks for the indemnification of the London commission. The resolutions will probably be handed over to the city council.

It was also decided to add improvements to the waterworks and offices on Ridout street.

DISCOVERS TREASURES OF ANCIENT CARTHAGE

Dr. I. Carton Finds Articles Dating Back To 600 B. C.

Paris, April 20.—The treasures of ancient Carthage have been discovered by Dr. I. Carton in the sealed chamber of a tomb on the site in the ancient city. The articles, all dating from the sixth century before Christ, include a cunningly wrought altar, covered with decorations of paint and stucco, busts of goddesses and Carthaginian women, the hair of the statues covered with gold leaf; statues of animals and children; statues of warriors wearing cuirasses; and large and small masks, lamp standards and figurines of carved ivory.

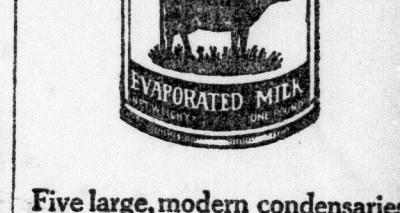
