FRUIT GROWERS TO HOLD ONE-DAY CONVENTION HERE

Interesting Program Has Been Arranged by Members of Association.

MEETING MARCH 20

A program that will appeal to every fruit grower in Western Ontario has been arranged for the one day convention of Western Ontario fruit growers to be held in Hyman Hall on March 20.

The convention is being held under the auspices of the Fruit Growers' Association of Ontario, the London branch of that association and the fruit branch of the Ontario department of agriculture. P. W. Hodges, director of the Ontario fruit branch will preside. Eight speakers will give addresses, while a number of important questions relative to the industry will be answered by experts.

At the morning session which opens at 10 o'clock, F. L. Gabel, fruit inspector will talk on "Small fruits, varieties and cultivation." Mr. Gabel will be followed by Prof. J. A. Neilson of Vineland experimental station, who will address the gathering on "Grafting and Budding." James E. Johnston, Simcoe, will tell of British market requirements.

In the afternoon, spraying problems will be treated by W. A. Ross of Vineland station; "Modern practices on a fruit farm," by Paul Fisher, Burlington; "The spray calendar," by Prof. L. Caesar, O.A.C., E. E. Palmer, Vineland station and central packing plants will be discussed by E. R. Bond of Mount Bridges, who has had a great deal of success along this particular line.

It was hoped to round off the convention with a banquet, but this was called off owing to the fact that a number of the growers from the western counties would want to catch the evening train to their respective homes.
