Los Angeles, Cal., March 31.—One bank robber was slain, his companion crippled by gunshot wounds, and \$12,000 taken from the Security Trust & Savings Bank branch was recovered today during two revolver fights and a chase.

One of the robbers was fatally shot by a civilian who saw the two men commander an automobile truck. The second robber was shot and captured by a deputy sheriff.

SIR ADAM BECK PREDICTS NEW CUT IN HYDRO RATE

Beck Sees Likelihood of Reduction of \$15 Per Horse-Power For This Year.

BRINGS UP ESTIMATES

Delivers Five-Hour Address, Dealing With Every Aspect of Niagara Affairs.

Toronto, April 1.—Introducing for discussion the hydro estimates Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the provincial hydro commission in the Ontario Legislature, tonight announced that Chippawa was now taking care of all its financial commitments, including sinking and allowance.

Amidst applause he added that there was some likelihood during the year of a reduction in the present average price of power of \$15 a horse power on the Niagara system.

Sir Adam said that where as in 1923 the estimates revenue from all plants on the Niagara generating system was \$8,845,000, the revenue for 1924 would be \$9,000,000.

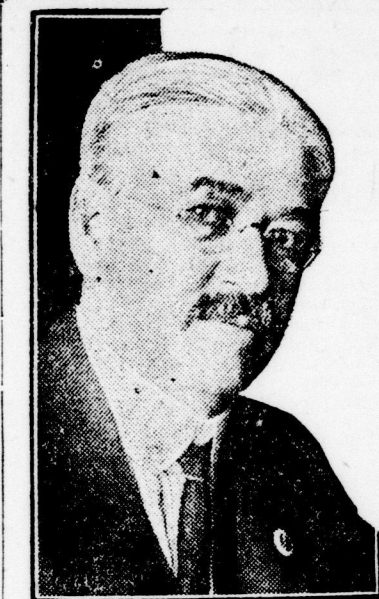
Of this \$9,000,000 of revenue, \$8,200,000 would be required for interest, \$1,217,000 for sinking fund, \$410,000 for depreciation, and \$1,280,000 for operation maintenance and repairs, leaving an estimated surplus for the year of \$400,000. In the same connection, Sir Adam reminded the House of his contradiction in 1921 of some of Hon. E. C. Drury's utterances, when Sir Adam said that when Queenstown was delivering 250,000 horsepower the average cost would be \$15. In August, 1923, when the plant was delivering only 227,366, the average cost was \$15.02.

It was Sir Adam's first address to the Legislature since his return, and for over five hours he proceeded, afternoon and evening, dealing with every aspect of hydro affairs over the province. The Gregory report loomed up in his references, and, although promising a full printed reply later, he dealt with what he termed the "personal" charges in that document, including the "malicious" one that he had misappropriated \$1,100,000 of power funds for radial purposes. Of that amount, he said, \$300,000 was in respect of hydro commission and the balance passed by the government.

"The money in question was received from the government, and is not chargeable to the power undertakings of the municipalities," he said. "It is universally admitted that all the money has been honestly expended, and it has never been and never can be suggested that one cent has been misappropriated."

Sir Adam concluded his address with references to the present proposal to provide grants for assistance in the construction of secondary transmission lines, which he said, would bring hydro power into the homes of the people of the farms—a boon to these people, which had been one of the chief triumphs of the hydro system in Ontario.

Following Sir Adam, Hon. Douglas Carmichael, former power commis-

sioner under the Drury government, made a semi-apology for a previous use of the word "dishonor." "If I offended anyone, I am very sorry," he said. "I was by no means speaking of the commission alone, but I still feel that the commission did not deal with the public as it should have."

Hon. Mr. Carmichael was disposed to quarrel with Sir Adam, on the matter of government grants toward the construction of power lines.

The House adjourned at 11 o'clock, with all estimates but one item carried.

In the evening, dealing with the expenditures made by the commission on the Toronto to Port Credit Railway, Sir Adam presented a short history of that railway.

"I wish to make it perfectly clear," he said, "that no expenditure was made by the commission until the consent of all the municipalities interested had been obtained; until the bonds of the municipalities had been deposited with the commission; until the prime minister had given his assurance that legislation would be passed at the next session, and until the prime minister had undertaken that the government guarantee of the necessary bonds would be given."

"When will these radicals be built?" inquired Hon. Manning Doherty. "That is a fine question," from a member of the government which smashed these radicals against the will of the municipalities," retorted Sir Adam. "You will be surprised yet at what we will do."

Workmen's Bill Passes.
Legislature this afternoon passed second reading of the bill amending the Workmen's compensation act, whereby workmen will be helped to rehabilitate themselves. The act provides that \$100,000 may be taken out of the fund provided by the employers for this purpose.

The prime minister said the amount of compensation was reduced as the man got better in his trade. Peter Heenan, Labor, Kenora, supported the bill and complimented the government on introducing it.

Another amendment puts the man who works in Ontario and lives in another province on the same basis as the workman who lives and works in Ontario as far as the provision of the act are concerned.

W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal leader, asking if C. A. Mathews, formerly assistant treasurer and his son-in-law, L. C. Mason, had left for unknown places, and if they were being followed by the police, was informed by the premier that it was not in the public interest to say what was going on. The premier said that the publicity already given in the press had delayed, if not defeated, certain ends of justice.

The act for licensing hotels in Ontario also passed second reading. It provides that a hotel shall be a place of at least six bed-rooms distinct from a boarding house or ordinary residence. The remainder of the bill is left to such regulations as may be provided for by order-in-council.

AIR FORCE ALTERED BY ORDER-IN-COUNCIL

Canadian Unit Is Now Entirely of Military Character.

Ottawa, April 1.—An order-in-council altering the character of the Royal Canadian Air Force became effective today. Formerly the Canadian Air Force was partly military and partly civilian in organization. Appointments were made by the air board, and members of the air force served half their time in military capacity and half in civilian. Hereafter the Royal Canadian Air Force is entirely military, and is a permanent unit. Enlistment is for the same term as in other permanent force units, and pay is similar except for flying men, who receive a special bonus. The King's regulations and orders for the Royal Canadian Air Force are modelled on the regulations for the British Royal Air Force.

IRISH GENERAL SENTENCED TWENTY YEARS IN PRISON

Carrick on Shannon, Ireland, April 1.—General Bohn, who as one of the chief leaders of the irregular forces in their operations last year, has been sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude, according to Mrs. R. Sheehy Skeffington, the radical Republican leader.

Bohn is said to have been the leader of the sacking of the town of Ballyconnell, when three civilians were killed.

PRESIDENT, DIRECTORS RESIGN
Montreal, April 1.—William C. Finlay, president of the Montreal Tramways & Power Company, Limited, and three fellow directors of the company forming the remainder of the old directors prior to the last annual meeting, have resigned.

MERCHANTS WANT 2 CLASSES ONLY FOR EGG-GRADING

Local Retail Grocers Hold Meeting in Chamber of Commerce Rooms.

APPOINT COMMITTEE

Egg-grading and what it means to consumers, merchants, farmers and wholesalers came up for a thorough discussion at a meeting of the retail grocers of London in the rooms of the chamber of commerce last night. About one hundred merchants from London and surrounding district were present, and though all agreed that the present law of grading was unsatisfactory, opinions varied as to methods that would prove satisfactory to those whose calling involved the handling of eggs. Most of the members believe that five grades of eggs are too many, the majority felt that two grades would be sufficient and that more than two grades are impractical.

George S. Hougham, special representative of the Dominion board of the Retail Merchants' Association, spoke of the work of that body in its nation-wide work of meeting the needs of that consumer through the raising of the standard of the retail store, and speaking of egg-grading, he added that there was no doubt that the grading of eggs was a step in the right direction, but that merchants should not be prosecuted for

their failure to grade properly until they had a chance to state before the government any objections that might be raised against such legislation or had submitted any suggestions for improvement.

It was decided to form a committee to go into the matter and to bring in a report for the next meeting of the retail grocers of London when a representative of the department of agriculture will be invited to attend. The members of the committee are H. F. Rosser, Harry Ranahan, Ald. Gordon Drake and W. H. Moody of St. Thomas.

R. B. Oldfield, district secretary of the retail merchants, also spoke.

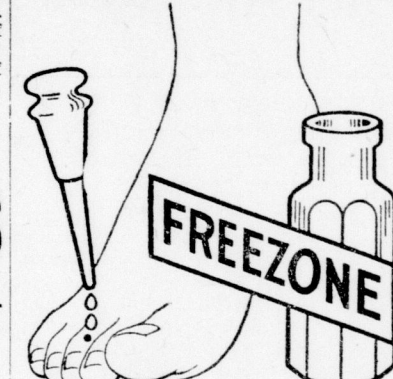
ARTHUR COLE NAMED COLLECTOR CUSTOMS

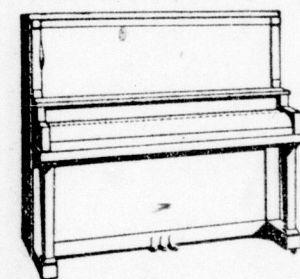

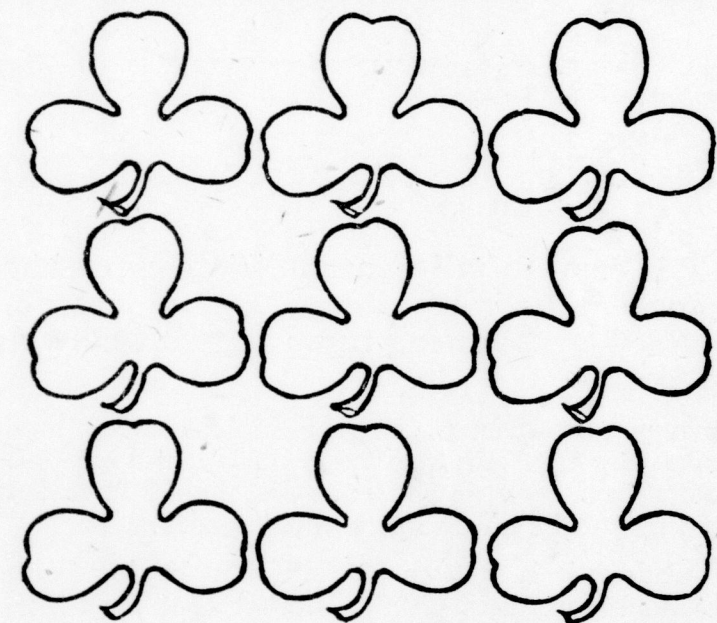
