DUMBELLS IN 'CHEERIO'  
AT GRAND TWICE TODAY

Good Cheer Abounds in Offer-  
ing by Capt. Plunkett's  
Famous Entertainers.

There is good cheer in the word "Cheerio," especially in reference to the title of the newest and by long odds best of all the "Dumbells" series of overseas revues. "Cheerio" closes its present engagement at the Grand with matinee and evening performances today. JIMMIE COOPER HAS  
TWO BIG SHOWS IN ONE

Another Cracking Revue At  
Grand First Half Week—70  
People in Company.

Wide variety of entertainment with the amusement making cast in two colors is the schedule for next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at the Grand Opera House, with two performances daily. This attraction is "Jimmie Cooper's Revue," with irrepressible Jimmie as chief entertainer of the big aggregation of 70 people. Cooper is a whole show in himself, for few, if any men on the stage are as full of pep as this indomitable worker. He is here, there, everywhere, every moment that the curtain is up, urging the members of his company from top notch principal to the least important chorus girl on to greater effort.

The Cooper revue is divided into two parts, the first being given over to white actors exclusively, and the second to colored ones. After the intermission the blacks give their own show, which is said to be one of the most lively and tuneful combinations of jazz, harmony and "blues" singing seen in many a day.

Heading the white aggregation of entertainers in support of Mr. Cooper are Grace Godale as prima donna, Dolly Benfield as comedienne, Alice Belaire as ingenue, Joe Barrett as juvenile, and the Blossom Sisters in a very pleasing sister act. Then there is a mysterious performer called Tizzan, whose identity will have to be figured out by the audience.

In the colored half of the company are Julian Arthur, Ten Red Hicc Syncopators, Bessie DeSota, a colored dancing marvel from Plantation Days; Snow Fisher, famous struttler, formerly with "Liza," and the Four Dancing Poets.

In the white portion of the show Mr. Cooper has again secured a chorus composed of the very prettiest girls found in burlesque. He has trained them to work with all the finish of principals, and has clothed them in a bewildering array of costumes. And as Cooper himself works with speed and enthusiasm, this ensemble of girls can be truthfully described as one of the peppiest and best working outfits of the year.

PAINTING AN OPERA HOUSE  
MEANS WORKING ODD HOURS

Hamilton, Oct. 12.—Decorations under difficulties might explain the situation at the Grand Opera House here, where mornings and night hours after the evening performances are finished finds the popular old theatre turned over to the painters and decorators. Manager R. S. Roddick is having the interior of the theatre completely redecorated and painted. To do this without interfering with the daily business means that the workmen start work in the early morning, work until noon then give the theatre over to the matinee and evening performances, and then start again shortly after the evening crowds have left. The Grand has enjoyed good patronage this season, the policy of splitting the week between Columbia burlesque and the shows, the same policy in effect in its former home, the Grand Opera House in London, having proved decidedly popular.

## LONDONERS WILL SEE NEW YORK PRODUCTION

"Good Morning Dearie," New  
York Hit, At Grand Thurs.,  
Fri. and Sat.

"Good Morning Dearie," the world-famous musical comedy, which ran over 400 nights at the Globe Theatre, New York, will be seen at the Grand Opera House next Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings and Saturday matinee.

"Good Morning Dearie," is regarded as one of the important musical entertainments of the year. It is in a class with "Music Box Revue" and "Sally" and other similar big entertainments. Jerome Kern, who wrote the music of "Good Morning Dearie," also wrote the score for Ziegfeld's "Sally" and Edward Royce, who staged it, did a like service for "Sally" and Ziegfeld Follies.

The sequence of the scenes alone gives the drift of the story. Act 1 shows the workroom of the Toddle Shop with the midwives busy at the sewing-machines and Rose-Marie, the errand girl, coming in late and getting a scolding for it. The next scene shows a street in Chinatown, and this leads to the Hell's Bells dance hall. In the next act we are back in the showroom of the shop, with the mannequins on parade and Billy Van Cortlandt still in pursuit of Rose-Marie.

She impersonates a delinquent debutante and goes to the garden party at Mrs. Greyson Part's home, which introduces the Fragonard scene, and, later, a charming garden scene, the sort of garden where everything necessarily ends happily.

This attraction comes direct from its metropolitan triumphs, with the glittering Globe Theatre production intact, and a perfect cast and ensemble, selected especially for the trans-continental tour of the only company presenting this popular hit in Canada theatres. The sale of seats opens on Monday morning.

WORLD FAMOUS WELSH  
MALE CHORUS COMING

An event of great importance in musical circles this autumn is the coming on October 24 of the Rhonda Welsh Male Glee singers. This organization is composed of 16 of the finest Welsh soloists, gathered to-

gether by Viscountess Rhonda. Last year they toured the United States from coast to coast, finishing at Pittsburgh, Pa., where they won first prize in an international competition of 50 leading choirs.

D. E. Jones, Mus. Doc., in the "Pruid," Pittsburgh, Pa., says of the famous Rhonda Chorus, when the prize was won at the great musical festival (Eisteddfod):

"Even Wales sent one choir, and it soon proved its superiority by capturing first prize; but more than the money prize was the splendid American reception accorded the Welsh boys when it was announced they had won. Such shouting and weeping for joy, such handshaking was never witnessed at an Eisteddfod (singing contest), and never before have losing choirs displayed such a magnificent spirit of generosity."

The choir will appear at the First Methodist Church on Wednesday evening, October 24, 1923. At present they are touring Canada from coast to coast, and have so far drawn capacity houses at Halifax, Quebec, Ottawa, and several other cities.

NOTED ENGLISH ACTOR  
COMING TO THE GRAND

Lionel Atwill To Be Seen  
Here in "The Heart of  
Cellini."

B. C. Whitney is bringing forward Lionel Atwill in a brand new play described as a matter-of-fact romance called "The Heart of Cellini," by Anthony Wharton. It is said to be an embodiment of the celebrated Florentine artist and writer, Benvenuto Cellini, who lived during the early Italian Renaissance. Though the first sculptor of the time, Cellini's title to fame rests upon his Perseus autobiography. It is from the latter that Mr. Wharton has drawn his character. It is a colorful character, a man with many superstitions, a picturesque adventurer, in fact, with as many love affairs as fingers upon his hands. The play has been given an elaborate mounting. Mr. Atwill will be supported by Elsie Mackay in the leading feminine role and by a distinguished company of English players. Mr. Atwill has appeared almost continuously in New York for the past four years in the name parts of "Deburau," "The Grand Duke," and "The Comedian." Mr. Atwill comes to the Grand October 25, 26 and 27.

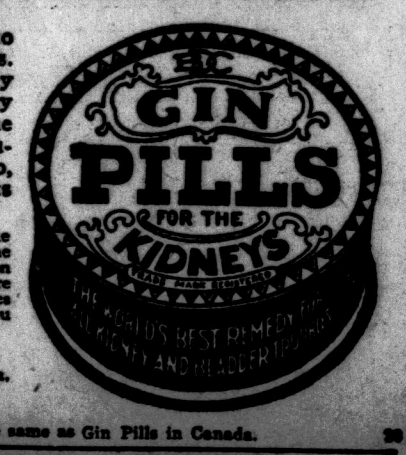
