Higher Principles

Dorothy Dix

Women, as a Class, Live Cleaner Lives and Are More Honest, Faithful and Loyal Than Men-How, Then, Can They Be Accused of Having "No Principles?"

A man correspondent writes: "Will you please explain, from the viewpoint of a woman, why women have no principles?"

I can answer this by a blanket denial of the charge that women lack principle. Also I can



make a good pot-and-kettle argument and prove that one sex is just about as black as the other. Statistics will bear me out in the assertion that just as many women as men have been willing to go to the stake for the sake of their principles, and that far more men than women languish in our jails because they were short of prin-

When we speak of people having good principles we mean that they are honest, that they are virtuous, hat they are trustworthy and loyal and faithful: that they are truthful and will not do a mean or little Judged by this high standard of human conduct, the average woman would make a pretty high

That women, as a class, are honest is shown by the fact that they are chosen by astute businessmen as cashiers. You hardly ever go into a store, or a restaurant, or a moving picture theatre, where some pretty, little, fluffy-headed girl is not handling the money. And evidently none of it sticks to her fingers, for we very seldom hear of an absconding woman cashier.

Money means more to a woman than it ever can to man. A woman has more need of money than a man has, because with it she can buy the pretty clothes that will enhance her beauty, or camouflage her homeliness; with it she can go to the places where she will meet the sort of a man she would like to marry. So the honesty of these girls who handle thousands of dollars every day without stealing a penny of it is about as acid a test

Women are honest about paying what they owe. They have a horror of debt, and the great majority of them never rest until they have paid off every cent they owe.

Every one knows women who had such a high sense of the sacredness of an obligation that they impoverished themselves after their husbands' deaths to pay off their debts for which they were not legally liable.

That women have a higher code of personal conduct than men is proven by the double standard of morality of the sexes.

The woman who swears at the altar to be true to her husband nine times out of ten lives up to her oath. But it is probably best not to inquire how many men keep their marriage vows. Very few men ever even think of giving to their wives the same sort of loyalty that they demand of them.

Women are faithful. Once a woman gives her heart to a man, she loves him on to the bitter end.

She will go with him through poverty, and sickness, and disgrace. It is women who haul men out of the gutters and go on loving them. It is women who are waiting at prison doors with open arms to take back the men who have been outcasts from society.

Women have a higher sense of duty than men have. There are hundreds of cases of wife desertion to one case of husband de-

It is a common thing for a man to sneak away and leave his wife and the children he has brought into the world when he finds their support becoming burdensome to him. But it is the rarest thing in the world for a poor mother to abandon her helpless, little children. On the contrary, she will work her fingers to the bone to support them rather than put them

It is women whose sense of duty makes them sacrifice themselves to the old. It is the sisters, not the brothers, who sacrifice themselves for their parents, who put aside thoughts of marriage, or give up the career that opened up the life they longed to lead in order to stay at home, and minister to the wants and bear patiently with the querulousness of an old father or mother.

My correspondent says that women have no principle. He will not deny that they are honest, that they are faithful and loyal; that they do their duty even when it calls for self-abnegation; that they live clean lives. In what respect, then, do they show lack of principle?

Perhaps he will say that while they are honest in big matters, the are unscrupulous in little; that a woman who would not steal a thousand dollars from you, will hold out her street car fare from the conductor, or have a dress sent up from a store on approval, in order to have a home dressmaker copy it.

Or, perhaps, he will say that women are less truthful than men, that they are less candid, and forthright, and more given to equivocation. Well, at last accounts, Diogenes was still out with his lantern hunting the perfectly honest man. And nobody has contradicted the psalmist's assertion, when he said in his heart, that all men are liars. Furthermore, men cannot furnish as good an excuse as women can for their shortcomings in these respects.

For woman's lapses in the small matters of absolute honesty and truth are a hangover from the state of slavery in which she has existed up to the last twenty years. She had no economic inde-pendence. She had to get everything she had out of men, so it is no wonder she sometimes took dubious ways to do it.
