The Indian war canoe Tilikum, which started from Victoria in May two years ago, with Capt, J. C. Voss, and Norman Luxton on board, and which voyaged across the Pacific via the South Sea Islands, Fiji and Samoa, has been reported from Wellington, New Zealand. Luxton left the voyage at Fiji, and after making the voyage to Australia by steamer, abandoned the scheme, and returned to this Coast. Voss continued, and was last reported voyaging along the Australian Coast, where his canoe was damaged while being transported ashore for show purposes, and he recovered damages amounting to \$2,000 from the transfer company. The vessel arrived at Wellington on May 4. With Capt. Voss is H. E. Buckridge, an adventurous young man who fought through the South African campaign, and was on board the ship Discovery in her Antarctic voyage. He was brought to Australia by the relief vessel, after leaving the Discovery. The Tilikum is being exhibited at the New Zealand port.


