A WINTER SPIN

A rather unusual occurrence took place on Dec. 24, 1899 at New Richmond, when R. O. McWhirter of New Richmond Centre, rode on his bicycle a distance of about two miles and returned pronouncing the road in splendid condition for a wheel.

On page one will be found the seventy eighth annual report of the Board of Nova Scotia. It is a most encouraging statement; besides paying dividends totalling \$100,000 and paying bonuses of \$10,000; adding \$100,000 to the officers' pension fund, and writing off bank premiums \$125,000 it transmits \$100,000 to the reserve fund and carries over a balance of \$44,685. The net profits after providing for losses, etc. totals \$664,123.

BOOMING AGRICULTURE
Encouraged by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture there are now in attendance at the short course at the Dalhousie Agricultural College thirty students of New Brunswick. Hon. Dr. Landry is spending a few days there studying the situation with a view to encouraging the development of the work for New Brunswick farmers' sons and daughters. The Dairy School at Sussex will open this year about the middle of March when practical and scientific instructions in factory and home dairy making will be given.—Gleaner.

OBITUARY

The death of Mrs. Ellen Lewis, widow of the late E. Lewis, formerly principal of the Grammar School here took place at her home at an early hour Sunday morning after a long illness of consumption. The deceased was thirty seven years of age and leaves three children, two sons and a daughter, to mourn the loss of a kind mother. Her mother and two sisters have lived with her for some time. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2:30, Rev. P. J. Stackhouse officiating. A large number of citizens attended to pay the last token of respect to the departed. Notice is hereby given that an application will be made to the Parliament of Canada at its present session for an Act incorporating The Restigouche Log Driving and Boom Company with a bonding privilege of One Hundred and fifty thousand dollars with power to conduct and carry on on the Restigouche River between the limits of the Intercolonial Railway Bridge at Matapedia, a line drawn from Ferguson's Point on the New Brunswick side of the river to Murray's Island and a line drawn from the Southern extremity of a line dividing lots one and two of the Restigouche Range east of Dusted's Point on the Quebec side of the said river and Gillis' Island including all channels and fringing between the said Intercolonial Railway bridge and the most seaward wharves or other works necessary to facilitate the transmission collecting, sorting and rafting all logs floating into said limits, and with right and authority to drive down the said Restigouche River from the south of Kedgewick River to the bottom limits of said company, all logs coming within the said driving limits and for such purposes to place and maintain all necessary booms and piers with all other piers usual and necessary in the premises, including the power of expropriating lands necessary for their work and undertaking and that the said Act of Incorporation declare that the said works are for the general advantage of Canada.
