

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



The more they struggled, the being wet would stick to them, and clog their feet and legs, so that they could not get into the ground. Those that could not get off died on the heads. The paste prevents all eggs from hatching. For a number of years we have had good cabbage. Twice going over with the flour saved mine, while most of my neighbors lost theirs. It may be necessary to apply it oftener if hard rains come and wash off the flour.—Cor.
