Some fifteen years ago, when a statute of Luther was erected at his native place of Eisleben in Saxony, the mayor of the town, a Roman catholic, unvailed it and presided at the ceremonies, and no offense was given by his doing so to the Roman catholic church. And this was only typical of the way in which modern civilization has come to regard Martin Luther. The special kind of warfare which he carried on is no longer necessary, for the ir-The special kind of warfare which he carried on is no longer necessary, for the irregularities he denounced are no longer permitted by the church. The spectacle that commands the respect of all classes for this remarkable man is that of his standing alone against the world in the strength of this remarkable man is that of his standing alone against the world in the strength of his honest convictions.
