

WEDDING BELLS.

St. James' Cathedral was on a festive yesterday. It was the occasion of the wedding of Miss Ella Gooderham, eldest unmarried daughter of Mr. George Gooderham, to Rev. E. C. Johnson, curate of St. George's Church, New York.

For some time before the ceremony a crowd continued to congregate about the cathedral doors until by 1 o'clock the church itself was literally jammed. A place of awning was stretched from the southern porch to the entrance gate for the accommodation of the wedding party, and here the crowd was thickest.

The bride entered the cathedral at 1 o'clock and advanced towards the altar, which was beautifully decorated with white flowers. Bank Statements.

Editor World: The statement, report and proceedings of the Bank of Montreal just submitted to the public should be considered as eminently satisfactory both by shareholders and the public. Financially the bank is exceptionally strong, in fact stronger than is necessary, and in a position to insure the country with confidence in its ability to meet all legitimate wants as the trade revives.

It becomes the duty of the executive officers of the leading banking institution in the Dominion on the occasion of the annual meeting of its shareholders that they should express an opinion upon the financial and trade prospects of the country. This duty has been admirably fulfilled by Sir Donald A. Smith, the president, and Mr. E. S. Clouston, the general manager, who between them and without going into long-winded trade details have given a pretty clear idea of the situation and future prospects. Mr. Clouston especially is to be commended for the many valuable points he has made. The silver question alone is one of the highest importance and deserving the close attention of all financial institutions. As a literary effort Mr. Clouston's production is quite equal to that of any of his predecessors, and in other respects is proving himself a worthy successor of the many able men who have preceded him.

SHAREHOLDERS.

The Saratoga Convention. The bulletin for the Saratoga convention has been issued. All the departments have first-class programs. An excursion has been arranged from Toronto by boat to Rochester, giving four hours in Rochester, and by West Shore Railroad from Rochester. The fare from Toronto to Saratoga and return, including \$2 for N.E.A. membership fee and sleeping berth both ways on the boat, will be \$10.00. Very reasonable rates can be secured at Saratoga. The rate at the hotel for Canadian headquarters is \$1.75 per day. Cheap excursions have been arranged from Saratoga in all directions. Among the best are (1) to New York and back to Saratoga, a way by Hudson River steamers and one way by rail; (2) to New York and back, and from New York to Boston and return; (3) to New York and back, and from New York to Boston and return. There are many pleasant trips towards the Lake George District, the Adirondacks and the White Mountains. The convention begins on July 12, and tickets will be good till the close of the holidays.

Two Men and a Cow. A complicated case involving two milkmen and a cow, was tried before Justice Wingfield yesterday morning. Alexander Davidson of Pope-avenue charges James Armstrong with the theft of a cow. Some time ago the parties made a bargain for the transfer from Davidson to Armstrong of three cows, including the one whose ownership is now in dispute. According to the complainant Armstrong did not fulfil the conditions of the transfer, and he therefore only gave him two cows. Armstrong took possession of the other and locked it up in his own barn, for which Davidson brought the charge against him. Mr. Wingfield has the case under consideration and will give his decision this morning.

An Unsatisfactory Office.

The office of Street Commissioner Jones has of late become so damp and unsatisfactory for occupation, that he is entirely unfit for occupation. There is a pond of standing water under the floor. A coat left hanging on the wall for a few days became badly mildewed. Mr. Jones will request the council to provide him other quarters at once.

Mr. W. Stewart Recommended.

The Board of Works held a special secret meeting yesterday afternoon, at which they resolved to recommend the council to engage as City Engineer Mr. W. Stewart of McLellan, Stewart & Chapman at a yearly salary of \$5000.

Messrs. Meredith & Co. yesterday filed in the Queen's Bench office a petition against the return of J. A. Lowell (Rad.) as member of the House of Commons for the county of Welland. John Brennan of the town of Thorold, laborer, is the petitioner.

Before Justice Macdonald a motion was made to discharge the defendant in Queen v. Toland, but was argued to allow service of notice on the Minister of Justice. The jurisdiction of the act giving Magistrate Deane power to try the offence of forgery is in dispute.

A motion was made to Mr. Winchester to set aside an appointment for the examination of J. C. Breckenridge as a judgment debtor, at the suit of the Cooper Coal Company, but was dismissed. The ground was that the sheriff had not made a return nulla in bonis to the writ of execution placed in his hands.

Mr. Winchester made an order setting aside an attachment order issued on the strength of affidavits setting out that Isaac L. Lawrence of New-avenue had absconded with the firm of Edridge & Co., in which he had an interest as \$100 per month. He now has a claim for \$450 wages and expenses as a result of the engagement, and when Lawrence left a short time ago for the States, to attend a trial in which he was an interested party, Brooks thought, from what he could learn, that he had absconded, and returned he found a bailiff in possession of his house.

Willing to Pay \$1000.

The Ontario Electric Railway Company have signified their willingness to pay the \$1000 asked by Assessment Commissioner Maughan for the stop and land at Sunnyside between the Grand Trunk tracks and the lake shore. The railway will probably be ready for operation by July 1.

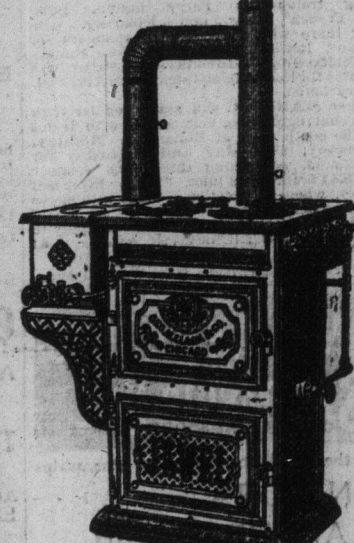

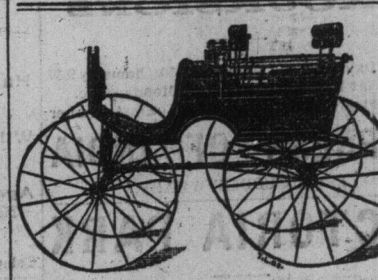
