Ottawa, July 4.—The Militia Department received a cable yesterday morning which shows that the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles are coming home at once, as well as the 2nd C.M.R. The cable says to cease further payments to dependents here.

Canadian Get Lands.

London, July 4.—Lord Onslow says the blockhouses in South Africa would be invaluable for use on the farms, which the Government was repossessing. Lord Milner had informed the Government that all of the resources in land and money at his disposal at present had been absorbed by men from the United Kingdom, Canada, and Australia.

Mass Meeting at Paris.
Committee Appointed to Aid Facts of
Sanford Rescue and Inform Royal
Humanity Secretary—To Raise Fund.

Paris, July 8.—Mayor Brown occupied the chair at a mass meeting of citizens last night at which resolutions touching the recent experiences of Joshua Sanford and his rescuers from the well on the Skelly farm, were passed.

One resolution recorded the meeting's "high sense of the noble heroism and self-sacrifice displayed by those persons who bravely risked their lives from the 24th to the 27th June, 1902, in their efforts, which happily proved successful, to rescue Mr. Joshua Sanford from the well on the farm occupied by Mr. George Scott."

Another, "that this meeting is of the opinion that many of those who assisted in the work of rescue are worthy of special recognition at the hands of the community, and of the Royal Humane Association, and that a committee consisting of Messrs. David Brown, J. H. Fisher, Richard Thompson, F. Shaw, and T. Scott, be appointed to make the necessary enquiries, secure evidence and conduct such correspondence as may be necessary to lay the facts before the Royal Humane Association, and be it further

Resolved, that such committee be requested to take steps to obtain subscriptions towards a 'Sanford Rescuers' Fund,' with a view to presenting testimonials to those who in their various capacities are especially worthy of recognition, and that such committee be empowered to determine the shape such testimonials shall take and make all arrangements for presenting same."

Moved by T. Scott, Davidson, seconded by James Sawyer, That the meeting desires to express its most sincere sympathy with Joshua Sanford in the sufferings undergone by him during the four days he spent underground, realizing as he must have done, that his escape could be looked forward to with only the most meagre hope, and to place on record its admiration for the fortitude displayed by him in his most trying situation."

Sanford has had two very uncomfortable days, owing to the formation of three very painful abscesses, one on the left arm, one on the arm pit, and the third in the crown of his head, in consequence of which his temperature went up, and his general condition was one of distress.

Last night he was easier, but his recovery will be delayed.

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Twenty-Three Election Protests

Nine Against Liberals and Fourteen

Against Conservatives.

Toronto, July 8.—Three more election protests were filed yesterday afternoon, bringing the number of protests now in up to twenty-three.

The protests received yesterday were from Addington, against J. S. Reid, Frontenac, against J. S. Gallagher, and Centre Simcoe against D. Davidson, the former two Conservatives and the latter a Liberal.

The protest against Dr. Jessop in Lincoln has not yet been filed at Osgoode Hall.

The cross appeal made by Mr. Macle in Lennox was to be heard before Mr. Justice Macdunn at Osgoode Hall at 10.30 this morning.

Word was received in the city yesterday that a protest had been filed at Osgoode Hall against the return of M. G. Cameron, the successful Liberal candidate for West Huron.

A protest has been filed in North Westport by Lieut.-Col. H. C. Gwyn, acting for A. H. Wardell, the defeated candidate, against the return of R. A. Thompson. The petition recites the usual list of charges of corruption on the part of the successful nominee's agents.

Protest in North York

Stratford, July 8.—A petition was filed here yesterday afternoon, with the local registrar by John Brown, ex-M.P.P., and Reform candidate in the recent election, against the return of J. C. Konietz, as member of the Legislature for North Perth. The petitioner, in addition to the usual charges, makes a demand for a scrutiny of votes, and claims the seat.

Paris Me. Violent For Road.

Owen Sound, July 8.—There is one man in North Grey who feels particularly annoyed because George M. Boyd has not been given the seat he won on May 29th last. He is William Cudding of Clavering postoffice, a voter in the township of Keppel. Mr. Cudding has always voted Liberal, but he decided to vote for Mr. Boyd this time. He has three fingers off his right hand, and it was necessary for him to hold his pencil between his thumb and little finger. In making his ballot he noticed that one of the strokes was short, and in attempting to stretch it out, he cut the right length of the pencil slipped, and the stroke went below the line of Mr. Boyd's compartment. The ballot was not counted and Mr. Cudding would like the opportunity of proving that his intention was good, which opportunity will probably be given him at the scrutiny.

ORM, WILL, CANNOT, ORO

Rain and Wind Storm in Eastern and Western Ontario.

The Trouble is Now Central Over North-West Territories, Although It Arises From the Heat Here—Valuable Hare and Contents, North 27,000, Hare in Picking Township—Hare Killed a Glens—Railway Trains Abandoned.

Toronto, July 8.—During the past few days thunderstorms have been general throughout the province, commencing in the north-west, and moving southwards. The rain in Toronto has amounted to 1.33 inches, which is considerably above the average, and there has been more rain in the northern sections of the province than in Toronto.

The present unsettled condition of the weather will continue for some days, but the storm is now central over the Northwest Territories. The electrical storm was caused by the heat and had its origin in this section.

Reports from outside towns show that the storm yesterday was general in the north-west, and that it was very heavy in some places. Yesterday afternoon at Guelph, six inches of water covered the G.T.R. tracks for a distance of 100 yards. The thunder and lightning was terrific. The rain came down in torrents, and over a wide area wheat and oat crops were ruined. The ensuing damage will be great.

Barren Harvest.
Pickering, July 8.—One of the most terrible storms seen in this section for years, passed over here yesterday afternoon. Rain fell in torrents for hours, accompanied with strong hail and strong gales. A number of fruit and other trees were blown down, and much damage will be done to crops.

David E. Hughes' large barn west of the town was struck by lightning and burned to its foundation. A new Massey binder and about four hundred bushels of grain were consumed in the barn. The loss will be \$25,000.

Thomas Knox had a valuable horse killed by lightning in the stable below his barn. His son was in the stable, but escaped with a severe shock.

Washout Near Peterborough.
Toronto, July 8.—The C. P. R. train from the east, due in Toronto at 7.25 last night, was about seven hours late because of a washout on the line near Peterborough. The train, leaving here for the east, however, was able to leave on time, as the washout was repaired before it reached the place.

Horse Killed by Lightning.
Glencoe, July 8.—During an electrical storm which visited this section yesterday afternoon, a valuable horse belonging to the Woodburn Milling Company was struck by lightning and instantly killed. The horse was hatched to a post near the mill at the time.

All Trains Abandoned.

Result of Washouts—Hare Drowned in

Allegany River.

Olean, N.Y., July 8.—A heavy rain and cloudburst did much damage throughout Allegany County yesterday. Many washouts along the line of the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad occurred, and all trains were abandoned.

The Erie Railroad, washouts occurred at several points between Salamanca and Hornellsville, and at this time a large number of trains were stopped.

A horse was killed by lightning. Paul Fisher, 10 years old, was drowned in the Allegany River here. While swimming, he was overpowered in an eddy that had been created by a sudden rise in the river. A companion, Claude Varnard, 12 years old, was also drowned. The bodies of water and recovered the body.

Schools Defeated by Titus.

United States Sealer Turns the Tables

on the Toronto Man.

Henley-on-Thames, July 8.—In his preliminary heat yesterday with C. Titus, of the Union Boat Club, New York, Lou Scholtes, of Toronto, was vanquished, and is out of it for the Diamond Sculls for 1902.

Scholtes caught the water first, rowing 37 strokes to the minute and had a distinct lead at the quarter mile. At half the course he led by about three-quarters of a length. Time, 4.05.

Titus was spurred, but Scholtes responded and at the three-quarter mile he led by a good length. Titus then gradually gained until the last hundred and fifty yards when he overtook, won by a length and a half. Time 8.33.

The result occasioned no little disappointment among the Canadians present, who had looked to Scholtes taking the first heat at least.

Over-confidence and perhaps lack of judgment contributed to settle the question, for Scholtes, who also displayed a slight nervousness. Titus, on the other hand, showed excellent judgment and skill and won his race by scientific sailing.

In heat A Beresford in 8.47 defeated Johnson, and in heat C Etherington-Smith of the Leathers, came in ahead of Prevail, the French representative. Smith, who has been coached by Tom Sullivan, is regarded now as the likely one. His time was 8.43.

Jumped From the Bridge.

Ottawa, July 8.—Another man is reported to have jumped from the Chaudiere bridge into the falls. Geo. Mercer, a barber, who could not be found yesterday, is said to be the man. A car conductor says that Mercer crossed the bridge with him and told him that he was going to "jump over the falls," and not to forget that his name was Mercer.

Outside Near Chatham.

Chatham, July 8.—Early yesterday Joseph Hawley, aged 85, son of William Hawley, 10th concession, Hawley, committed suicide in his barn by hanging. The body was discovered by a sister. The deceased was subject to fits of melancholy.

Australia and Sugar Questions.

Melbourne, Australia, July 8.—The Federal Government has decided not to become a party to the Australasian sugar convention.
