The South River Lumber Company are g extensive improvements to their mill at South River, Out. Last senson they cut 6,000,000 feet of lumber, and der-ing the coming season expect to cut about

The Turner Lumber Company, of Midland, Ont., are reported to have sold all the lumber they will manufacture at Midland this season at an advance of \$3 over last year's price. They have on the skids and hauled 10,000,000 feet of white pine legs of excellent quality.

At the Crown Lands office, Fredericton, N. B., a two-mile timber both on Turtle Creek was sold lest week to Mr. Drydon at the uport price of 86 per mile, and a two mile borth on Teague Brook, Glouceste County, to J. H. Barry at \$364 per mil-s. The latter price is the highest ever pai , to the New Bresewick Government.

Elm staves and busoweed heading are strong and higher in price, while coiled hoops are lower. At Buffale jobbers ste No. 1 elm flour barrel stav \$9.25 to \$9.50; No. 2, \$5 to \$5.25; No. 1 wood beading, 5% to 6 cents; No. 2 11 to 4 cents; coiled hosps, \$10.25 to \$10.50 tor 6 feet, and \$10 to \$10.25 for 5%.

As pine values have been hardenic throughout the winter, hemleck has al strungthened considerably, although not in proportion. There is a frirly good supply of hemiock in the Chicago yards, and white domand has been excellent through the winter, there is still a good assertment left for spring trade. The prespects are that there will be a large cut of hemleck logs in the northern forests this wister and a correspondingly good supply of houle at the mile next summer, but in view nor, but in view of the great scarcity of pine it will prob all be needed to replace that weed. Hemlock munufacturers are therefore counting upon an excellent domend the coming seeson. Of late prices have been rather irregular, but a meeting of manufacturers is to be held at Milwautee on Tuesday of next week and doubtless more uniform quotations will be attained when the manufacturers get tugether and find out what their brothres are doing .-- American Lam-

LEESER EXPORTS.

The United States governs empiled a statement showing the im-erts of lumber from British North America for the calendar year of 1902, the eter parties of which was received m Canada. The leading items are as

Canada last year was greater than any previous years excepting 1896 and 1897, on the exports were 100,001,000 feet and 283,770,000 feet respectively. The value of rted lumber, howe er, was highest in the history of the trade, this being due to the increased value of white pine lumber.

STATISTIC OF PINE STOCKS.

The Bureau of Grades of the Mississippi Valley Lumbermon's Association and the Wisconsia Valley Lumbermon's Association have compiled a stock short of the pine lumber held by manufacturers and wholesalers in the St. Craix, Mississippi, and Chippewa Valleys, Northern Minnessta and tributary districts on the first day of January of this year. The total stock aggregates 1,147,946,863 feet, as against 1,136,113,736 feet for the year before, and 1,444,187,209 feet on Junuary 1, 1901. It will be seen that the stock of lumber on hand varies but little from the previous year. This remark also applies to shingles, but there is a considerable increase in the quantity of lath. Notwithsumption of lath in standing the larger cos building during the past year the producms to have been greatly accelerated and stock on hand at the beginning of the year is nearly twice as large as it was a year ago and about a sixth larger than on January 1, 1901.
