EVIDENCES continue to multiply that the Chicago World's Fair will be a very good place to stay away from this summer. Even if cholera, or some other frightful epidemic, does not break out—as it probably will—dangers to life and limb are likely to be numerous, as the arrangements made for the accommodation of the expected throngs of visitors put a premium on disasters on a large scale. According to the *New York Herald* 279 temporary hotels, containing 33,945 rooms, are in course of erection. As they will nearly all be torn down after the Fair is over, their construction is of the

It is a pity there is not enough of manliness in the party to resent this dragging of their professed principles in the mud to please a vain, conceited old man, who ought to be thinking of other things than strutting about in antiquated frippery to receive the servile homage of snobs.
