In view of the great concern felt by diabetic patients in Canada as a result of Many benefits are derived from the use of reports to the effect that the drug tolbutamide, under the trade name "Orinase", has dangerous properties, is the minister yet in a position to make a statement to the House about the use of this drug in Canada?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, this matter has been checked into by my officers in the Food and Drug Directorate. This was a conclusion of one paper submitted at a recent conference of scientists but there are other scientists who disagree with the findings. Scientific papers on investigations conducted especially in the United Kingdom and Scandinavia would indicate contrary conclusions. We are continuing to examine all the data, but in the meantime we are far from satisfied that there anything harmful here which would is require action at this particular time. We have also been in consultation with the Canadian Diabetic Association and they feel that the protective elements of this drug are very necessary for many diabetics in this country. Until we have greater clarification on what the research is, and because it is so contradictory, we feel that it is not appropriate to take action now.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): May I ask the minister whether the government of Canada is doing any monitoring of patients in Canada who are using this drug in order to determine statistics for our own use?

Mr. Munro: As far as all the scientific research that is being carried on is concerned, Mr. Speaker, we are aware of what is going on in other countries. We are not conducting research ourselves, but are relying on studies carried on in other countries. This does not mean we do not regard it as important but we do not want to duplicate the work. We are carrying on extensive research in other areas. That is the situation at the present time.

Mr. Robert Muir (Cape Breton-The Sydneys): A supplementary question to the Minister of National Health and Welfare. Are we to understand from the minister's remarks that the government does not plan to restrict or control the use of Orinase in Canada until further studies take place?

Mr. Munro: That is correct, Mr. Speaker.
