representations of the company, that the change in the tariff has made that much difference. In any event, the company was established when the tariff was at the higher of the two rates and they understood at the time what they were getting into.

Mr. Dinsdale: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. As the bicycle market in Canada and North America is booming and as the inability of the Sekine bicycle plant to compete in this market arises from the budget changes, will the minister take the responsibility of consulting with other ministers and departments involved so that the right hand of government may know what the left hand is doing in this respect.

Mr. Jamieson: Mr. Speaker, the question is whether, indeed, the premise of the hon. member's question is correct. I am not satisfied that that is the effect at the moment, but I am prepared and have been for some time to meet with the Sekine people. I shall be in Manitoba this week-end, and if a meeting can be arranged so that I can find out what their difficulties are, I will be glad to do it. I have consulted with the Minister of Finance on a number of occasions on this matter.

EXTENSION OF SUBSIDY TO DOGFISH INDUSTRY—
GOVERNMENT POSITION

Mr. Donald W. Munro (Esquimalt-Saanich): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of State responsible for Fisheries.

I want to ask him whether he intends to recommend to his colleagues of the cabinet, and in particular to the President of the Treasury Board, the extension of the policy previously implemented on the west coast, which gave subsidies for catching dogfish whose meat contains many proteins and vitamins. This extension would enable west coast fishermen to continue their trade during the dead season and its cost would not be over \$50,000 a year, I understand.

Hon. Roméo LeBlanc (Minister of State (Fisheries)): Mr. Speaker, this matter is now under study. However, I hope we will be able to come to the conclusion that the program will be more successful than in the past. This is what we are trying to determine.

Mr. Munro (Esquimalt-Saanich): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask a supplementary question.

Since such a grant would allow fishermen to reduce the dogfish population, those voracious and well known predators, and that it would facilitate greater reproduction of herring and salmon, is the minister aware that such a grant would not only help fishermen but would also favour herring and salmon stock growth and, if so, is he prepared to give that measure the priority it deserves?
