

2. On a bilateral, or government-to-government basis, CIDA does not provide funding to the population sector in China.

The China Family Planning Association, an autonomous, non-governmental organization (NGO) is a member of IPPF. In 1988, IPPF contributed US \$920,000 towards the programmes of its China affiliate, most of which was spent on audio-visual equipment and information/educational materials of the Association's information activities.

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PRIVILEGE

COMMENTS DURING DEBATE ON BILL C-28

Mr. Stan Keyes (Hamilton West): Mr. Speaker, yesterday afternoon I had the privilege of rising in this place to address a motion which would have deleted the clawback provision of Bill C-28. In the course of my speech, which dealt with a very serious matter of great concern to thousands of my constituents, I was repeatedly interrupted by the hon. member for Burlington who used expressions that I trust Your Honour will find unparliamentary.

They can be found in the *Hansard* of yesterday, Tuesday, December 19, on pages 7216 and 7217. Even if the Chair were to find these expressions permissible, I feel that they have impugned my seriousness as a

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member of Parliament and prevented me from properly representing the legitimate concerns of my electors. I would ask that the member for Burlington do the honourable thing and withdraw his remarks.

Mr. Albert Cooper (Parliamentary Secretary to Government House Leader): Mr. Speaker, in the absence of the hon. member for Burlington, maybe we could ask that you reserve on this. We will speak to the member for Burlington and see what can be done.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Paproski): Yes. Usually when we have a question of privilege raised, the members involved are in the House. I realize this could be the last sitting day for another month and I know the member was anxious to get it on the record. I am sure the parliamentary secretary will bring it to the attention of the hon. member for Burlington.

Mr. Keyes: Mr. Speaker, I want to make the Chair aware that all parties were aware of my intention to raise this matter. Notification was given. Due, I suppose, to the various happenings between three o'clock and the present time, the hon. member for Burlington may have been unable to attend due to other duties, but he was aware of it, as was the Chair.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Paproski): The hon. member for Burlington is on the Board of Internal Economy and I know they are meeting.

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JUSTICE AND THE SOLICITOR GENERAL

AUTHORIZATION TO TRAVEL

Mr. Albert Cooper (Parliamentary Secretary to Government House Leader): I have been informed that there have been discussions among the three parties concerning the Standing Committee on Justice and that there would be unanimous consent for the following motion:

That the Standing Committee on Justice and the Solicitor General be authorized to travel to Washington for the period from Sunday, January 21 to Thursday, January 25, 1990, in order to participate in an international conference on criminal code reform and that the necessary staff do accompany the committee.
