for from their Queen-courage was mentioned by the Leader of the Government, which she exhibited on her visit-dedication to duty, self-sacrifice, to mention only a few. But however much we admire these virtues in our Queen, I think we admire even more the homely virtues-her home life, her happy family life, the love of her husband and children. Time and time again it has been said that the family life of our royal family provides a splendid example not only for her subjects but for all peoples everywhere.

If I may make a personal reference, honourable senators, I had the great honour of accompanying the Queen on three occasions, twice in Ottawa and once in Great Britain. On those occasions I noticed that on meeting dignitaries of state, the army, navy, air force, and other services, she was most courteous and very queenly; but it was when as our Queen she met, as it were, the common people that she showed up at her best. I was greatly impressed on two occasions when she met the old veterans at the National War Memorial by the interest she showed in them and their families, and also the great warmth and friendliness she showed in chatting with the Mothers of the Silver Cross.

The Leader of the Government has said that the Crown is part of the Government of this country. It has been since the days of Confederation. The Fathers of Confederation one hundred years ago realized that the Throne was and would continue to be an emblem of unity for all our people.

On her recent visit here and in her public appearances and utterances, the Queen, by her tact, reserve and understanding, not to mention her unflinching courage, demonstrated that she will continue to help to bring about a better understanding among all peoples in Canada. Indeed, as Her Majesty said:

True patriotism does not exclude understanding the patriotism of others.

I am sure that her influence has already been felt and appreciated.

In closing, honourable senators, may I say that as long as we have the Crown-and personally I hope we will continue to have it for many generations-and as long as we have a Sovereign such as we have today, it is easy to say, "God bless the Queen, God bless her gallant husband, God bless her family."
