WESTERN WHEAT VIA HUDSON BAY

Capt. A. F. Thomas Says Route Will Open in Nineteen-Eighteen. SAVING TO FARMERS Western Agriculturists Will Have Opportunity to Pocket Six Cents Per Bushel. Western wheat will be shipped by the Hudson Bay route by the fall of 1918, according to Captain A. F. Thomas, of 77 Elmer avenue, who has returned to his home after sixteen months at the scene of operations in the work of transporting wheat from Alberta to Fort William at 15 cents a bushel. Captain Nelson figured that the cost of handling grain to Port Nelson would be six cents less than that of the Atlantic coast route, with the certainty of cutting freight costs practically in two. The savings which will be made in placing the grain in England, and last, but not least, because the price is right.

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Supt. Ferrier Recommends That Thirty Be Trained for This Purpose. In his report to the management of the Industrial Schools Association, Superintendent Ferrier states that day that the Victoria Industrial School had twenty of its boys enlisted for overseas service, and over 200 paroled boys are in training. This may be considered an excellent showing, but he is known that the majority of the boys are not eligible, being under age.
