Taxes are not so grievous as render us unable to enter into a War; and it is likewise to be hoped that no People under the Sun will be more zealous, upon this Occasion, to defend his Majestv's, the present Royal Family and the Nation's just Rights and the Liberty of their Country, than those of Great Britain, in Opposition to any Power, let it be ever so great, that shall attempt to injure or destroy either the One or the Other: And that HEAVEN in its Divine Goodness may maintain in us the Spirit of Union, Strength and Courage, which is now more necessary than ever, are the hearty and ardent Prayers of all his most Sacred Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects.

Here I shall subjoin, as Memorials never to be forgot by all the Faithful in these Kingdoms, the Advice of an Englishman, in the Year 1701, how we ought to act in Case of a New War: — Together with the Opinion of a Dutchman, in the Year 1713, touching what the British and other Nations were to hope from relying on French Faith.

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
