Caron, Colonization Missionary of Abitibi and Temiskaming, who, since the spring of 1913, has organized and conducted to the district several excursions of settlers from Old Quebec. These people are brought from the same parishes and settled together so that they avoid the hardship of going into a country surrounded by strangers. By 1917 there had been settled in the cantons open to settlement, 635 families, and the population is estimated to be well on to 7,000 souls.
