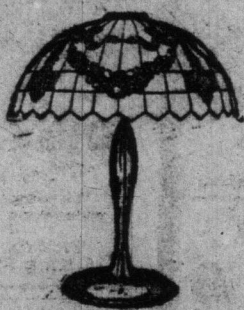

Found Dead in Bed.
WELLAND, Nov. 24.—Mrs. Rebecca Fair was found dead in bed this morning, at the residence of her son-in-law, John H. Crow, death having been caused by heart failure. She leaves one son and three daughters.

Campbell Remanded Again.
Colin A. Campbell was once more remanded in police court upon a charge of criminal negligence. It was his morning car which struck Bruce Ridpath in Yonge-street three weeks ago. Ridpath is still in a semi-conscious condition at St. Michael's Hospital.

DEMAND COMMISSION TO PROBE FARMERS' BANK

Deputation Gets Promise of Borden Cabinet That Sympathetic Course Will Be Followed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—A large representation of shareholders and depositors of the defunct Farmers' Bank waited on the government this morning. The deputation was made up of people from all parts of Ontario. Premier Borden was present, also Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, and other members of the cabinet. Mr. Gilmour, as spokesman, said that this was a peculiar case in the financial world and there must be exceptional relief in the case of the sufferers. He claimed that the former finance department was largely culpable in allowing a bank "conceived in fraud" to secure a charter. Amongst others of the deputation who spoke were Mr. J. H. McLeod, of Belleville, and William Laidlaw, K.C., of Toronto. They pointed out that they did not ask relief from the government on legal grounds alone, but also on the grounds of the sympathy of the people and of the government being with them.

Hon. Mr. Borden stated in reply to Mr. White that a fund had been set up for the taking of money from the public treasury, which meant a good deal of responsibility.

Bank Act Disregarded.

It was pointed out that the company headed by Mr. Travers had not fulfilled the conditions of the Bank Act and that they had been led by a man, not of sterling integrity.

Mr. Laidlaw, in his address, said it was admitted that after the certificate had been issued, there was mismanagement. But the issuance of the certificate itself was a mistaken act. This could be proven by evidence in the trial and also in the facts placed before the department. The sufferers whom he represented were quite willing, he said, to have the facts uncovered by a competent body appointed by parliament. He pointed out further that the act of the department which was culpable was in not heeding the warning given by the president of the Bankers' Association.

A little later in the course of his argument, Mr. Laidlaw stated that there was no real stock paid for.

What Kind of Negligence?
Hon. W. T. White asked if it was a case of negligence. He further asked him if he distinguished between careless and guilty negligence, but Mr. Laidlaw refused to be explicit on this point.

Hon. Mr. White asked what would be a proper measure of damage, but Mr. Laidlaw in answering would state no exact figures. Mr. Laidlaw further pointed out that the Farmers' Bank was not a legal corporation at any time and therefore had no power to contract liabilities. The deputation asked for a commission to investigate. The premier and Hon. W. T. White would not commit themselves to any definite plan, but promised a favorable outlook for their future welfare if it were possible.

Provincial Oddfellow Dead.
LANSING, Mich., Nov. 24.—H. N. Wilder, grand secretary of the Michigan L.O.O.F., died here to-day. He was 58 years old.

PRUDENTIAL'S FOUNDER DEAD

NEWARK, N.J., Nov. 24.—Former United States Senator John F. Dryden died at 6 o'clock to-night.

John Fairfield Dryden was born on a farm near Farmington, Aug. 1, 1839. In 1875 he established the Prudential Insurance Company, the first successful industrial insurance institution in America. He was secretary of the company up to 1888, and president since that date. He was a director of the U.S. Casualty Company and several banks and trust companies in this city and New York. He was a Republican senator from 1902 to 1907.

JOACHIM PASSENGERS ALL SAFE

NASSAU, New Providence, Nov. 24.—The passengers from the stranded steamer "Prinzess Alice" of the Atlas Line, were transferred from the "Vigilance," 70 miles from Nassau.

William Williams, Eryan, in the course of an interview, said: "No incident occurred during the transfer of the passengers from the Prinzess Alice to the Vigilance. Everything was orderly. The weather was calm and there was no nervousness anywhere."

Mercy Petition for Brinnell.
A feeling exists among some citizens of Toronto that Roy Brinnell should be dealt with leniently. Brinnell was found guilty of wilful negligence, thru which he caused the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Salter. This is the first case of the kind where a conviction has resulted. Mr. C. Robinson, his counsel, intends to urge clemency to back up the petition, which, it is said, has already been signed by several citizens. Because of Mrs. Salter's death Justice Riddell immediately brought the speed law to the notice of the police, who forthwith put it into force.
