LITTLE GIRLS' COSTUME—No 1063—Sailor suits for girls have los nothing in popularity and are brough out each season with slight changes. A pretty design is here shown, the skirt is side pleated and attached to the lower edge of the underwaist, the blouse is fitted by under arm and shoulder seams, and finished at lower edge with a casing and drawing string; the upper part of the blouse is cut away in a V shape, and completed with a sailor collar, which may be square or pointed as outlined. The bishop sleeves are gathered into wristbands or formed into pleats as desired. Serge, mohair or fiannel with collar and shield of white, trimmed with braid, would make this garment effective. The pattern is cut in 5 sizes, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 years. For medium size it requires 4 3-4 yards of material 27 inches wide.

Blankets and flannels are greatly improved and softened if a table-spoonful of ammonia is allowed to every paliful of water in which the soap has been boiled.

Brushes, combs, sponges, chamois leather are made clean and fresh by using ammonia in the water.

In washing the leathers the great secret for keeping them soft is to leave the soap in them at the last, not to rinse it out.

Ammonia in the water with which you wash carpets helps greatly to revive the color and to clean them.

In the wash, if ammonia is used in the soaking water, a tablespoonful to each pail of water, as well as to that in the boil, the work will be halved, and much less soap and soda needed.

When scrubbing floors and tables a little ammonia in the water will whiten them in a very short time.

It is also efficacious in cleaning sinks.
