Liverpool Quotations Lower—Modern  
Miller on Prospects—Argentine  
and American Shipments.

Friday Evening, April 8.  
Liverpool wheat futures closed today, 1/4d lower, 1/2d higher, and 1/4d higher.

At Chicago July wheat closed 1/4d higher, and July oats 1/4d higher.  
Northwest receipts today 222 cars, week 240 and year ago, holiday.  
American wheat exports this week 3,500,000 bushels, year ago 3,100,000 bushels.  
Carlots at Chicago today: Wheat 12,000 bushels, 0, estimated 0; corn 194, 0, 0; oats 2, 0, 0.  
Primary receipts: Wheat 200,000; shipments 102,000; corn 315,000; shipments 181,000. Holiday receipts: Wheat 100,000; corn 100,000; shipments 100,000.  
Argentine wheat shipments this week 2,000,000 bushels, last week 1,900,000 bushels; corn 720,000 bushels; last week 181,000 bushels.  
Quana, Neb.: The crop report of Chicago, Burlington and Quincy says that wheat in Eastern Nebraska is not so good as the middle of the state promises about half a crop. There is much damage in western sections.  
Canty & Co. to J. G. Beatty: G. S. Barnes, one of the pioneer farmers at Fargo, writes they are very much discouraged as to the outlook for spring work and that this season will surely result in decrease in wheat on the Red River Valley.  
Juts and calls, as reported by Ennis & Stoppani, 21 Main Street, Toronto: Milwaukee July wheat, puts 37 1/2c, calls 38 1/2c; New York July wheat, puts 32 1/2c, calls 33c.

The Modern Miller, St. Louis, says today: Continued improvement has been made in the condition of the winter wheat crop, under the favoring influences of rains and warmer weather. The situation in the Northwest, where there has been complaint of insufficient moisture, good rains have relieved the situation. The plant has a strong, healthy growth. Complaints of field pests are exceptionally few.

Hogs—Deliveries were light and prices were quoted as being unchanged at 4 1/2c per cwt. Many drovers complained that the world's quotations of 4 1/2c for select hogs were not being met.

Chicago Cattle Market.

Wheat—With the exception of heavy rains reported in the Northwest, there was nothing in the news of the day of any special significance.

Weather in North Dakota will still further delay delivery, as ground is already very wet. The wheat market is very quiet.

Government report for Monday will only show the condition of winter wheat and rye, as reported to April 1. It will be lower than last year.

Prices of wheat were lower. Liverpool and Antwerp were unchanged and Paris 1/4 to 1/2 higher. The demand for cash wheat was small.

The volume of trade was very much smaller today than yesterday. The selling of May wheat was very quiet.
