

REV. DR. SANDERSON.

Over 50 Years Ago, He Was Appointed Editor of the Christian Guardian,

and Is Still Able To Be Around. Says the Christian Guardian (Toronto) this week: "We were very much pleased to receive a call from Dr. Sanderson a few days ago, thus evincing his strength and ability to journey from London to Toronto. Dr. Sanderson was editor of the Christian Guardian for five years, 1846-1851, preceding Rev. James Spencer.
