COUNCIL REFUSES

TO PAY \$2,500 FOR

193 SPAN LIGHTS

No Agreement Made, and the Utilities Board Asking \$3,000.

At the meeting of the special committee of the city council, appointed to investigate the charges for street lighting made by the utilities commission, it was decided not to pay for 193 span lights across streets. The amount involved is approximately \$2,500.

Some time ago, Chairman Philip Pocock asked the council to install the span lights. The cost was to be borne by the commission, the agreement to run for three years. However, no formal agreement was drawn up, and the commission now has asked for more than \$2,500 for the lights.

The committee decided not to recommend payment for the 193 lights, but to pay for 62 serial lights. These latter were taken down to make room for the span lights, and the committee was of the opinion that the city should pay for them.

"We were asked to put up the lights by the utilities commission, and we were not to pay for them for three years," said Controller Shaw. "We intend to keep our part of the bargain."

"General Manager Buchanan says the Hydro-Electric Commission has ordered the payment," said Ald. Harley. "The Hydro Commission is simply ordering us to pay for the number of lights located on the streets taking into consideration no agreement made between the parties."

Some routine business was transacted at the meeting, and a suggestion was brought forward that a summer school should be held for two weeks every August. No action was taken.

LABOR MEN WILL

FIGHT EFFORTS TO

KILL COAL YARDS

Every Union Member Asked To Get Out and Canvass.

The regular session of the trades and labor council terminated rather abruptly last night, when a resolution that the meeting be adjourned and that the members attend in a body a gathering in the interests of the coal yard bazaar in Victoria school, was proposed and carried.

The session was only nicely started when a delegate, who is intensely interested in the coal yard question, arrived, and proceeded to address the local men around the use of kid gloves.

"The paid advertisement of almost a full column appearing in the press shows that the coal dealers are buying the press if they want to," he declared. "But they can't buy us."

In less than three minutes the members had begun to file out the door, as a result of his resolution.

Before they left, Delegate John Secker, who in the absence of President Joseph Dean, occupied the chair, urged all the delegates to get their various local unions to canvass for votes for the coal yard bazaar.

"Let every member of every local get out and work," he said, "and let the delegates report at the next meeting."

As a result of a meeting of the election committee, letters have been issued to all the locals dealing with the question.

An announcement of the 37th annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which takes place in Buffalo on November 12, was read, and laid over. No delegates are sent from here as a rule, but usually some of the local men attend as independent delegates.

A communication from the Bradford trades and labor council urging the appointment of labor men on the boards of the exemption tribunals under the military service act, was read, and will be acted upon.

It was stated that the C.W.C.A. hopes to get 20,000 pairs of socks every month from Ontario.

The presidents of the various branches will be conveners of special committees to look after the work.

NEW SHELL ORDERS

REVIVING INTEREST

IN MUNITIONS WORK

Trade Journal Makes This Comment On Further Contracts in Canada.

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ending September 18, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following observations: "The placing of further orders for 8-inch shells in Canada has revived interest in the munitions industry. Although there has been recently a reduction in output of shells there is still a considerable amount of money being expended on the production of munitions."

"What might almost be termed a chaotic condition prevails in the steel trade. What with the embargo and the delay in fixing prices at Washington consumers do not know where they stand. The logical result is that they are keeping out of the market and business consequently is decidedly dull. It is not at all likely that business will pick up until the conditions in the trade market are more settled and outlook prevails."

The embargo will affect the building trade to a greater extent than any other business, as the larger shapes are not rolled in this country. Prices of steel are stationary with no indication of a decline in the meantime. The embargo will benefit Canadian mills and the additional business will tend to keep prices firm."

"The pig-iron market is dull, but prices are holding firm owing to the shortage of cars and also as a result of the embargo. The coke situation is unchanged and production is being hampered by scarcity of labor and shortage of cars. The non-ferrous metal markets are weak and demand generally is light. Declines in prices have taken place throughout the entire market. The market for old materials is dull and consumers are still refraining from buying. Prices of scrap copper, brass and lead have declined, but steel and cast-iron scrap are firm. The machine tool market is quiet and the general situation unchanged."

MUST PAY TO SECURE UNDER-AGE DISCHARGES

Militia Orders Announce Change in Procedure for Too Young Recruits.

Those who desire to secure their discharge from the Canadian army on the plea that they are under age, will be required to pay the usual \$50 before they will be released, according to camp orders. Formerly such men were discharged without paying the usual fee, but they must now pay unless they enlist without their parents' consent, in which case the parents can by taking prompt action, secure the discharge. If the recruiting officer accepted the young man knowing that he was under age, the recruit can also obtain the discharge free.
