

COMMUNISTS SEIZE CONTROL IN MUNICH, BAVARIAN CAPITAL

COPENHAGEN, April 10.—The council of peoples mandatories, which has been in control at Munich, has been dispersed by the communists, who have formed a communist government there, according to the Frankfurter Tagespost of Nuremberg.

HUNGARIAN MAYGARS ATTACK AND PILLAGE RUMANIAN VILLAGES

GENEVA, April 11.—By the Associated Press.—Dispatches received by the Hungarian Press at Budapest reveal that Hungarian Maygars have attacked and pillaged several Rumanian villages in Transylvania recently. The Rumanian national guard resisted bravely, but was overwhelmed. Fifty Rumanians were killed and one hundred wounded.

GOVT. DENIES PROBE INTO RURAL LIFE

Hon. George S. Henry Declares Country Population Is Not Falling Behind.

U. F. O. MEMBERS SPEAK

New Element in Legislature Views Situation With Misgivings.

TORONTO, April 11.—A night session of the Legislature resulted from Nelson Parliament, Liberal, for Prince Edward, moving a resolution calling on the Government to appoint a commission to investigate the falling off of rural population in Ontario. Mr. Wentworth, opposing the appointment of such a commission, and expressing approval of Ontario's agricultural record during the war, and of the Government's efforts to increase agriculture in the province.

Mr. Wentworth submitted figures to show that there had been a falling off of 11,000 in rural population during the last 40 years, and that the city population had increased by over a million in the same period.

Among the reforms which Mr. Wentworth desired were: more charter banks in rural districts; extension of the system of district agricultural representatives; and better agricultural education. He appealed for a building up of a strong rural agricultural population.

"We have talked about rural depopulation for a decade," declared Hon. Mr. Henry. "We speak of the decline in agriculture, and the fact that the young men and women are going west to promote the same organization there as exists in old Ontario."

"The honorable gentleman would lead the House to believe that we have been in a decline during the war, whereas during that period 500,000 additional acres of land were brought under cultivation. We are not going backward, but forward."

"I see no use in appointing such a commission, knowing that the conditions will not remain as they are now," concluded Hon. Mr. Henry, who announced that agricultural school work to be established at Kemptville.

U. F. O. Members Approve. Benoit Bowman of Manitowish and J. W. Widdifield of North Ontario, both United Farmers members, spoke in defence of Mr. Wentworth's motion, insisting that the falling off in rural population was a question which necessitated investigation, and if possible, prevention. Both submitted that the resolution did not imply any criticism of the Government's policy.

Hon. Dr. Coady's consolidated school bill received second reading, and was considered in committee of the whole. The debate on the bill was concluded by Z. Mareau of Sturgeon Falls, who expressed confidence in the future of the educational department under the administration of Dr. Coady, and asked that the age for admission to English-French training schools be lowered from 14 to 12 years, in order to render children who passed the entrance at the latter age eligible.

COMPULSORY AGE FOR SCHOOL MAY BE RAISED TO 18

New Bill Is Introduced in Ontario Legislature by Premier.

PART TIME EDUCATION Provided For From 14 to 18 Years of Age.

(Special to The Advertiser.) TORONTO, April 11.—Thursday's debate in the Legislature on the extension of the school age has brought its results. The adolescent age bill, which was referred to by Hon. Dr. Coady at that time was introduced in the House tonight by the premier, Mr. William Hearst. The chief feature of the bill is that it provides for compulsory part-time education of the boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 18. Apparently the Government decided to comply with the request of H. Hartley Dewar and place the draft bill before the Legislature, even though it may not be adopted by the House.

The bill introduced by the premier divides adolescents into two classes: Those between the ages of 14 and 18, who will be required to continue part-time education for 400 hours each year, and those between the ages of 16 and 18, who will have 320 hours' part-time education each year.

The philosophy of the bill is such that boys and girls between the ages of fourteen and eighteen will be able to produce school dismission certificates or employment or has completed a course of examination equivalent to matriculation.

However, there are a number of exceptions provided for in the act. Those who are ill or whose physical condition will be taken as an excuse, and in the case of a boy or girl under sixteen, the act will not apply if he or she has passed the matriculation of a recognized university or has completed a course of examination equivalent to matriculation.

The act also places upon urban centres of 5,000 population or over the duty of providing such courses for "part-time" education. However, even if the act is passed this session—and it is expected it will not become law until the Lieutenant-governor issues a proclamation.

Race Horses and Whiskey Shipped In Car Together

Montreal to Mount Clemens Trip Results in Two Arrests.

(Special to The Advertiser.) MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., April 11.—Acting on a tip that something besides race horses was contained in a box-car billed from Montreal to Mount Clemens, the police this afternoon investigated while the car was being unloaded.

Their visit netted eleven cases of "Canadian Club," Thomas Sullivan and Peter Crudek, both of Montreal, who are under arrest, charged with bringing liquor into a dry state.

The men shipped a string of horses here for spring training, and claimed the whiskey was for their own use. The federal authorities will deal with the men.

BOLSHEVİK LOSSES 400 IN ONE ATTACK ON ARCHANGEL FRONT

ARCHANGEL, Thursday, April 10.—American and Russian forces yesterday raided the Bolshevik position about Bolshie Ozeraki, taking nine prisoners and two machine guns and destroying a blockhouse.

On the Khediv road American patrols met an enemy advanced post early this morning, taking three prisoners.

Other sectors on the north Russian front were quiet.

MORE RED REVERSES. LONDON, April 11.—The British war office, in a statement today on the Russian front, estimates that the Bolshevik losses in the attack on Sred Mekhenga on April 8, at 400 in killed and wounded.

The Bolshevik attempt to break through to the Delta and cut off the troops farther south on the river was foiled.

MUNICH COUNCIL ORDERS RELEASE OF WAR PRISONERS

BERLIN, Thursday, April 10.—The Munich revolutionary council has ordered the immediate release of all prisoners of war in Bavaria. The order frees thousands of Russian prisoners, including the Russian communist, Axelrod.

SOLDIER FAILS TO GET BETTER AFTER 'GASSING'

HAMILTON, April 11.—Pte. Gordon Hammond, a patient at the Mountain Sanatorium who was severely gassed while fighting in France, died at the Mountain Sanatorium today. He never recovered from the effects of the poison. His home is in Hartley, Ont.

KINNEL COURT-MARTIAL TO SIT AT LIVERPOOL

LONDON, April 11.—(Canadian Press).—The court-martial over the Kinmel Camp disturbances will open at Liverpool in about a week. Major-General Sir Henry Buxton will preside.

Other members are Col. C. M. Nelles, Lieut.-Col. H. H. Mathews, J. L. Ralston, J. B. Donnelly and W. Andrews, members of the military council.

The case for the prosecution will be presented by Lieut.-Col. T. P. Rowlands, while Major E. C. Worman will appear for any of the defendants who desire his assistance. Major E. E. Brown will be judge advocate.

LIBERAL IS ELECTED IN HULL BY ELECTION

LONDON, April 11.—Commander Kenworthy, Liberal, was elected over the Conservative, Lord Eustice Percy, in the Parliamentary by-election in Hull yesterday. The vote stood: Commander Kenworthy, 8,518; Lord Percy, 7,599.

FATHER AND SONS TO PRISON. SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., April 11.—William Woods and his two sons, Isaac and Samuel, were convicted of a serious offence against a girl under 14 years of age. The father was sentenced to Kingston penitentiary for thirteen years; Isaac to the penitentiary for six years and Samuel four years.

Neck and Neck in New Zealand on Prohibition

Returns, Including Soldiers, Give 1,226 Majority For So Far.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., April 11.—The vote on the question of prohibition in New Zealand stands on the returns so far received as follows: For continuance of the present license system 220,000; for prohibition 223,000. There are still a few home returns and the votes of 40,000 soldiers to be received.

MOST SOLDIERS AGAINST. LONDON, April 11.—The New Zealand soldiers in Great Britain have voted on the question of prohibition in Britain 3,500, against prohibition.

ITALY HAS CLOSED BAVARIAN FRONTIER

GENEVA, April 11.—By the Associated Press.—To prevent the spread of Bolshevism to Italy, the Italian commander in the Tyrol has ordered the closing of the Bavarian frontier, which would have been permitted to pass since Thursday.

IRISH DELEGATES FROM U. S. ARRIVE IN PARIS

PARIS, April 11.—By the Associated Press.—The three delegates chosen by the Irish senate to the League of Nations to appeal to the peace conference on behalf of Ireland arrived in Paris on Thursday. They are: Edward Guinness, former governor of Ireland; Michael Ryan of Philadelphia, and Frank P. Walsh, former chairman of the national labor board.

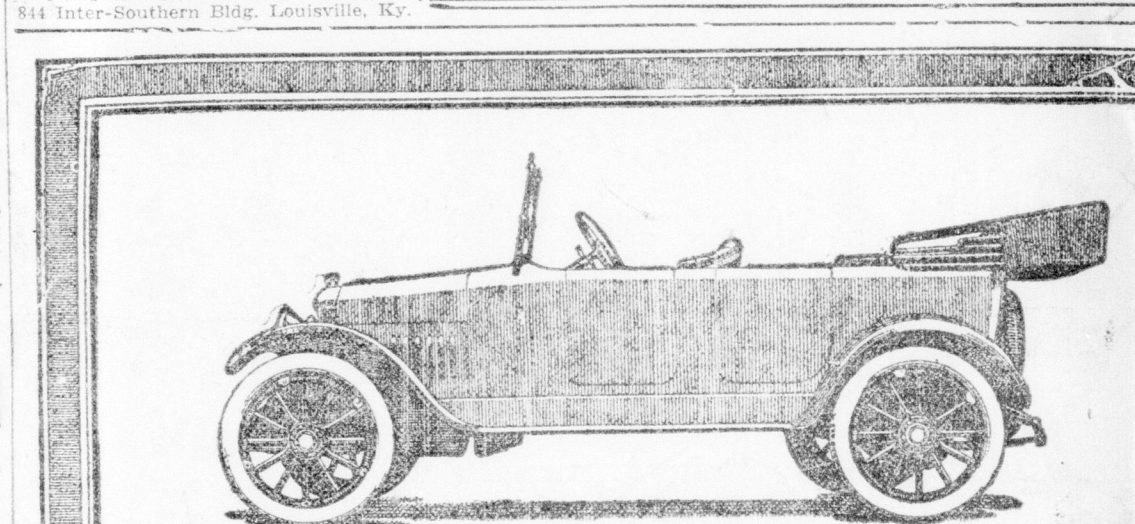
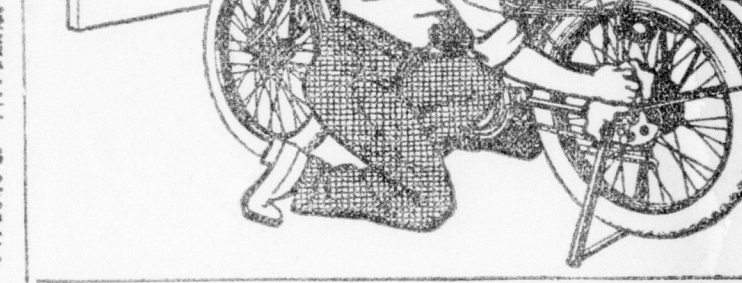
