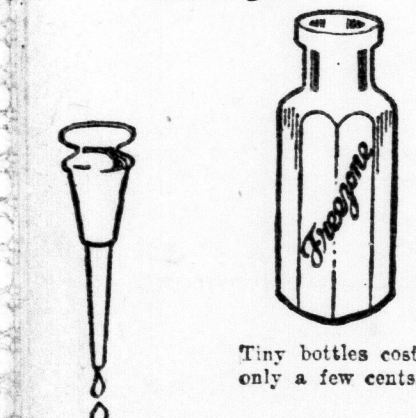

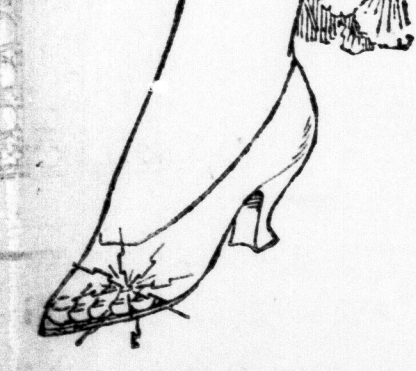

HOTEL PROJECT IS PROGRESSING

Number of Sites Under Consideration by Committee in Charge.

London's million-dollar hotel project is progressing favorably. This, however, is all Mr. George M. Reid, head of the Chamber of Commerce committee, which has the matter in hand, would say today. The committee met Tuesday afternoon, and it is practically understood that the project will be carried through in the near future. Mr. Reid stated that nothing would be definitely decided until at least \$250,000 has been subscribed, and this amount has not yet been reached.

A number of sites are under consideration. It is not likely that the hotel will be built further north than Fullerton street. Among the sites under consideration, it is understood, is the property on Richmond street, westward, between Fullerton street and Queen's avenue. Two banks, the Merchants and the Bank of Montreal, now stand on the Richmond street frontage.

WATCHFUL WAITING ATTITUDE ADOPTED BY CITY COUNCIL

As Regards Present Street
Railway Situation.

"Watchful waiting" has been adopted as the attitude of the city council toward the street railway situation which is expected to come to a head May 1.

The employees will hold a meeting Saturday at midnight to take a strike vote. On the outcome of this will depend the time of action, if any, to be followed by the council. Mayor E. S. Little was absent from the city today, and it was therefore impossible to obtain a statement from him regarding the matter.

At a meeting of the council, chairman of No. 1 committee, which deals with street railway matters, declared that the matter of fares and wages had not been brought officially to the attention of the council.

"So far as we are concerned the situation rests wholly with the company and the men at present, and until it is definitely known what they intend to do we cannot announce any policy in regard to the matter. If we were to announce officially that we would take a certain line of action in the event of certain situations arising, we would be forced by the company to take that action before we were ready to do so," he said.

That the Ontario railway and municipal board will be asked to take over the road in the event of a strike occurring seems to be the general opinion, but there seems little probability of that body being asked to take charge unless a strike does occur.

BUTTER CONTAINED TOO MUCH WATER

Ontario Creameries Fined \$20
in Police Court Today.

For putting almost 18 per cent water in butter which was retailed at 70 cents a pound on March 22, the Ontario Creameries, Limited, was fined \$20 and costs in police court by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon this morning.

John E. Dougall, chief inspector of the department of agriculture at Ottawa, laid the information. He seized the butter in a retail establishment on March 22, and sent it to Ottawa to be tested. It was known as Meadow Gold brand.

The law allows as much as 16 per cent water to be put in butter. A manufacturer can put less than that in, if he desires, so that he does not have to go so near to the maximum that he has an excuse for exceeding it.

David Charles Johnston, manager of the firm, appeared. The magistrate asked why he instead of the firm had not been charged.

ASSAULTS CHINAMAN, FINED TEN DOLLARS

Wm. Ferguson Appears in
Police Court Today.

William Ferguson was fined \$10 and costs in police court this morning for assaulting Lee Chong, the Chinese proprietor of the Ontario Cafe, in East London. Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon said that there was altogether too much of this kind of thing. The Chinaman, he declared, were peaceable citizens unless someone interfered with them.

On Friday last Ferguson and a friend went into the cafe about 6:30 p.m. After having a meal, Chong said, they refused to pay. He asked Ferguson to leave something as security, but Ferguson still refused. The defendant went out on to the street and was followed by the plaintiff. They ran to a fruit store on the opposite side of the road. Ferguson got there first and closed the door of the store, preventing the Chinaman from entering.

Finally the cafe keeper did gain entrance, but he also gained a black eye. Later one of the men paid Ferguson, said that the Chinaman threw a poker at him. Chong denied this.

"Liberty Hall."

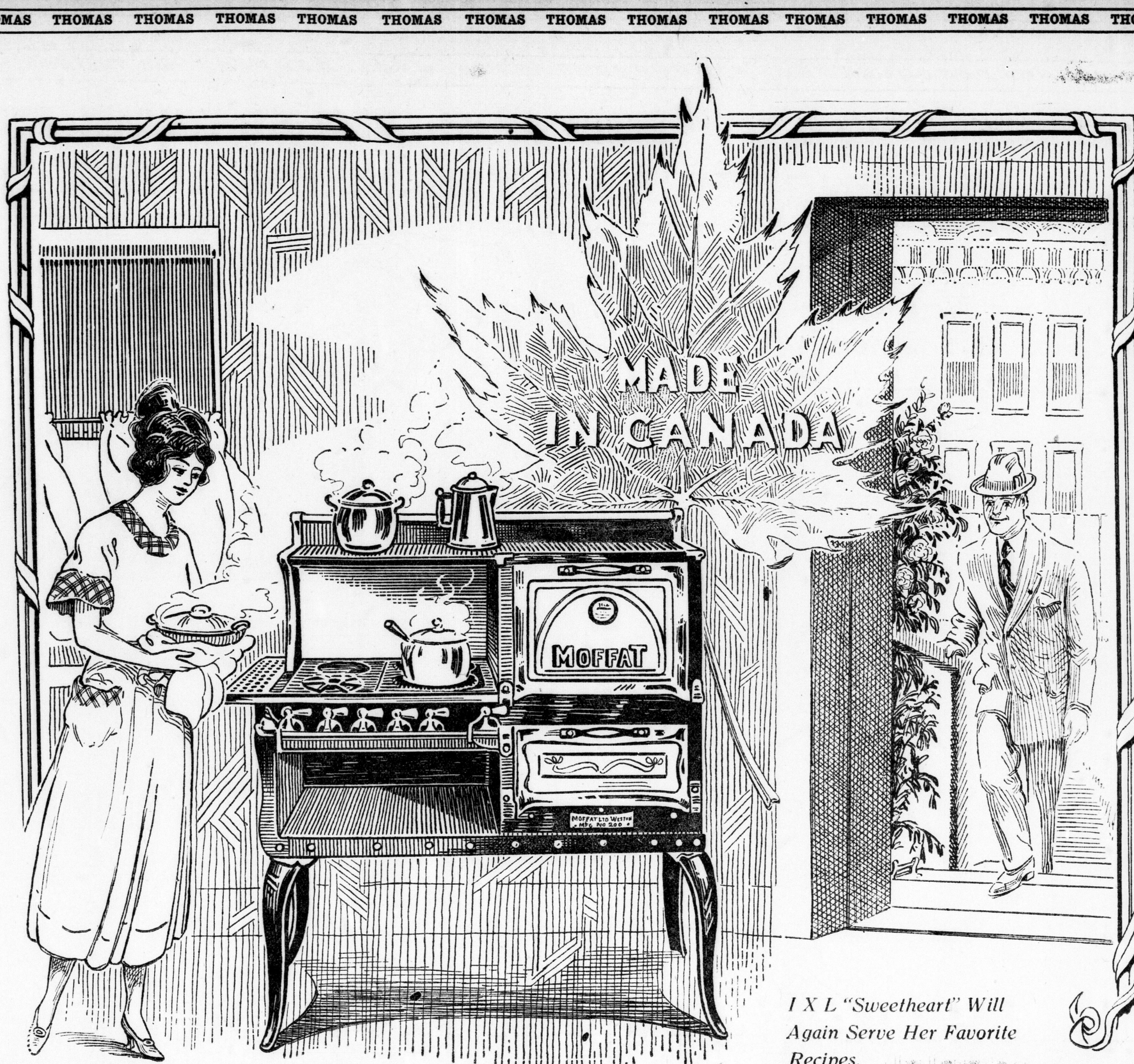

BLAMES PARENTS OF CHILD KILLED WHILE PLAYING IN STREET

Montreal, April 20.—"Were I in the place of this jury," said Deputy Coroner Prince this morning at the inquest into the death of Rebecca Ostroff, 3 years old, who died yesterday afternoon at the Royal Victoria Hospital, as the result of being knocked down by an automobile. "I would not send the chauffeur to the criminal courts as being responsible for this child's death, but I would send the parents for allowing a child so young to play on the street without proper protection."

The jury passed a verdict of accidental death and added a strong recommendation that steps should be taken to prevent young children from playing on the busy streets.

CANADIAN ZIONISTS ASK BRITAIN TO TAKE PALESTINE MANDATE

Executive Asks Rowell To Consider It.

Ottawa, April 20.—The executive of the Canadian Zionists' Federation waited on the Hon. N. W. Rowell today to request that the Dominion Government should declare its sympathy with the principle of a British mandate over Palestine. South Africa, the delegation informed Mr. Rowell, had already taken this step.

The British mandate is urged as a means of furtherance of the Zionist movement. In November, 1917, Right Hon. Arthur Balfour stated that the British Government was prepared to assume the mandate, but since then there have been several occurrences to prevent its assumption, such, for instance, as the recent proclamation of the Emir Faisal as king of Syria.

A declaration by the Dominion Government in favor of a British mandate is now being sought by Canadian Zionists especially in view of the coming meeting of the supreme allied council at San Remo.

At this meeting the peace treaty with Turkey will be determined and the future of Palestine discussed. Mr. Rowell promised to submit the question to the cabinet council for early consideration.
