

### TIME FOR MAKING **RETURN ON INCOME** HAS BEEN EXTENDED

Tax Statistics Must Be Given Inspector Not Later Than May 31.


The time for making income tax returns has been extended until May 31, according to the following notifica-tion, which George R. Tamblin , inspector of taxation for London, has reee'ved from the commissioner of taxa

Inspector of Taxation, London, Ont: You are hereby notified that the time in which returns may be filed without

penalty has been extended by the honorable minister of finance to the 31st day of May, 1920. This is applicable to form T-1, T-a, T-2, T-3, T-4, and T-5.

The honorable minister of finance The honorable minister of finance granted a general extension to the said date, but he will not consider any further extension under any circumstances whatsoever. This requires of inspectors that all possible returns be obtained by that date. If, for any reason whatsoever taxpayers claim that it is impossible to put in a statement within the time extended, then a tentative return should have written thereon the following, or something similar: "Tentative return pending adjustment for following reasons." Inspectors will please note that the commissioner will not consider the applications for further extension of time no matter how worthy any particular case may be, and correspondence in that respect is unnecessary.

The penalty once incurred is a statutory debt due to the crown, and only Parliament can waive the penalty by changing the act or putting through special legislation. Therefore, applications to this department in that respect are absolutely useless.

One of Many Borden Commissions Did Nothing But Spend Money.

DIDN'T WASTE PAPER

Commission On Economic Development Used Thousands of Dollars.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, May 3.—A commission which cost the country the very considerable sum of \$23,200.48 and never made a report, is the latest thing among all the varied delegations of responsibility and executive authority of which the present and the late Borden governments have been guilty.

Since 1911 commissions, committees, boards and controls have been as numerous as blackberries at Kazubazua. Whenever the Government desired to shelve responsibility of to provide jobs for impecunious friends an organization was formed for the purpose of making inquiry into any subject which first came to the mind of the cabinet. They cost the country thousands of dollars, but even if their recommendations were for the most part shelved and the dust of time allowed to accumulate on the bulky and expensive volumes which contained them, they usually made reports.

ports.

Economic Development.

Not so the economic development commission appointed under the chairmanship of Sir James Lougheed several years ago. The commission was appointed to inquire into almost every conceivable question relating to the development of the Dominion. It toured here and there and took evidence. It called witnesses to Ottawa and heard them there. It paid the fees of "experts" called to testify before it. And the members of it apparently put in good heavy expense accounts.

fore it. And the members of it apparently put in good heavy expense accounts.

But it never made a report, excepting of its expenses, which, as has been stated, amounted to over twenty-three thousand dollars.

For many sessions past members have been asking what the results of its deliberations and investigations were. This afternoon John Campbell of Nelson was informed that "no report has been made, but the duties of the commission being largely suggestive and advisory, their views on certain subjects have been discussed informally with the Government for the purpose of advising or assisting the Government touching many subjects upon which it has been necessary to take action either by legislation or otherwise."

Numbered Over Score.

The present Borden Government, before its members commenced to drift away from it and before defections set in, numbered over a score of more or less able-bodied men of average intellect, who pulled down from the public treasury a total of about \$200,000 per year in salaries alone, not including expenses. They were assisted in their labors by the largest army of civil servants which has ever been conscrepted in Ottawa under any government since confederation. And yet it paid twenty-three thousand dollars to the economic develonment commission, so called, for "suggestive and advisory" purposes.

In extenuation there is the comfort that at least the commission did not waste paper on a report.

OTTAWA, May 3.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King asked in the House today if it would not be possible to come to some understanding as to the adjournment of the House. If the House could agree to adjourn at 11 o'clock he thought business would be conducted better.

Sir George Foster said his experience was against making fixed arrangements for the close of the sittings of the House. Adjournment had always been guided by a general sense of what was fitting and feasible.

BLOCKED TEMPORARILY

Amendment Might Prevent the Union Members Getting Conciliation Board.

OTTAWA, May 3.-Keen criticism in the House today resulted in the temporary blocking of a senate bill to amend the industrial disputes investiga. J. F. Reid, MacKenzie. tion act (the Lemieux act). The clause of the bill particularly at issue was one relating to the authority of union leaders to apply for a board of conciliation. Under the present act such authority must be approved by a majority of the members of the union present at a meeting called for that purpose. Under the bill the approval must be given by a majority of all the members of the union.

Especially critical of the bill were Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal Opposition, who, as deputy minister of labor, drafted the Lemieux act, and Angus McDonald, recently elected Labor-U. F. O. member for Temiskaming. It was Mr. McDonald's maiden speech in the House and was followed with interest from all sides.

Mr. King argued that if a number of men working in a mine were dissatisfied they could not, under the bill, obtain a board on their own application. At the evening sitting, when the House was monotonously discussing technicalities of the bill, William Duff of Lunenburg, N.S., lent vigor to the proceedings by an emphatic demand that one clause should be struck from the bill. It was the clause which provides for advance polls for railway employees, sailors and others. "The clause is absolutely useless to sailors." Mr. Duff declared, "It is class legislation."

The clause stood over. and the House adjourned at 11:30 p.m., but not without a clash between Hon. Mr. King and the solicitor-general. Mr. King suggested that as the House had done a good day's work, it should adjourn to enable preparation to be made for the following day. He intimated that much progress would be made by adjourning. Mr. Guthrie warmly replied that he wished it to be distinctly understood that the House was adjourning on the suggestion of the leader of the Opposition. He considered 11:30 an unreasonable hour to adjourn.


