Old Fashioned Preacher of the Cross Who Appeals to the Common Folk by His Broad Sympathy and Conviction of His Sincerity.

Gipsy Smith began his mission in Massey Hall on Saturday night and held three meetings on Sunday, they attendance in all numbering nearly 12,000. Crowds were turned away on Sunday evening in spite of the rain, and in every outward respect the visit of the great English evangelist has commenced with notable success.

"In no other city on this trip has the response been so blessed on the first day. Thank God," was his closing comment at the service last night.

"I expect this mission will crown the work of my trips" he remarked. Since he landed at New York July 25 last, he has preached 600 times, to somewhere about 3,250,000 people.
