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PROPERTY BILL CARRIED

Majority of 27—R. L. Borden Disputes Federal Authority to Expropriate Ontario Lands.

OTTAWA, May 9.—(Special).—The Ontario and Michigan Power bill, promoted by James Cunniff, was given its third reading Saturday morning by a straight government majority of 27.

R. L. Borden strongly resisted the argument that the federal government had the right to expropriate provincial lands.

"If this parliament, acting within its jurisdiction, can expropriate or authorize the expropriation of lands belonging to the provincial government, then the legislature of the province, acting within its jurisdiction, can authorize the expropriation of lands belonging to the government of Canada.

In discussing the Canada Life bill. J. G. Turritt (Lab., Assiniboia) said it was corporation legislation against the people of the west.

Mr. Borden concluded by saying that the power of expropriation was the only point in the bill from which he dissented.

LIVERPOOL, May 9.—Lord Charles Beresford, upon whom the Liverpool University to-day conferred the degree of doctor of laws, took occasion to lecture his compatriots on the "deplorable physical defects that recently have developed in the race."

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 9.—Reviewing stands are being put up in the streets of Stamboul to-day in preparation for the procession to-morrow following the crowning of the sword upon Mehmet V. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 9.—Only two constituencies have yet returned the results of the polling in Saturday's general parliamentary general election in Newfoundland.

One of these, Carboner, elected Goddison, a supporter of Sir Edward Morris, the acting premier, by 44 votes at the seat which he lost by 23 votes at the last election in November.

FRANCE FEARS REVOLUTION

Already Capital Is Being Rushed Abroad—Government Is Taking Firm Measures.

PARIS, May 9.—(New York Tribune Cable).—The government is resolved to stake its existence on its fight against the insurgent postal and telegraph employees and his energetic minister of public works, Louis Barthou, are now fully aware that the immense majority of the nation is supporting them in their struggle with the revolutionary radicals like Mascuraud, whom they believe have the right to strike. The Clemenceau cabinet has taken extraordinary measures, and fully prepared to crush the threatened revolutionary strikes.

The French Republic has never before been confronted with a more serious situation in its own servants in the postal and railway departments have been organizing themselves into groups and syndicates, fracturing the workmen of the General Federation of Labor and with the proletariat under the dictatorship of "King" Patada and his communist leaders, who shake their fists at President Fallieres and at all the representatives of civil and military authority. They preach anti-militarism and anarchy.

Capital is alarmed, and during the last six weeks over a hundred millions of dollars of French funds have been hurried abroad. The agitation of the rebellious civil servants has already done incalculable injury to the industrial and commercial prosperity of the country. M. Clemenceau knows perfectly well that unless this revolt of government employees is stopped by the bud the parliamentary regime in France must disappear and be replaced by the Commune of 1871. No foreigner would feel secure in a country without law or order, and France, while retaining her intellectual and artistic supremacy, would be reduced to a second-rate nation.

All intelligent Frenchmen are fully alive to the situation, and are firmly behind M. Clemenceau in the present life and death struggle against the anarchy, and the proclamation of the Commune of 1871, which is glorified by "King" Patada and the insurgent state employees.

Situation Is Brighter. PARIS, May 9.—(C.A.P.).—Conditions are rather favorable to the government in its controversy with the postal employees, and it is not likely that a strike will be declared for the present.

The government's firmness has made a deep impression on the rank and file, and the leaders of the strike movement may conclude that the battle until they are better organized and prepared for what would prove to be a hard struggle.

A meeting called for to-day by the federal committee was attended by 4,000, but no great enthusiasm was shown. A resolution was adopted to go out at the word of command in the fight for reinstatement of the dismissed employees and for complete reform in the postal services. Delegate McCarty, representing the English postal employees, gave assurances of the financial and moral support of his countrymen.

A section of the postal employees is engaged in exposing alleged scandals in the telephone service. The charges made that much money has been squandered, and particular reference is made to purchases in the United States to replenish the postal telephone exchange burned last year.

The various unions in the Seine Department have called a meeting of delegates for Wednesday to decide what steps shall be taken to help the employees in case of strike, to counter-balance the aid offered to the government by merchants and employers.

BRUSSELS, May 9.—An arrangement has been concluded by the various ministries whereby in case of necessity the state employees, including soldiers, could be drafted to other services for the purpose of meeting such contingencies as might arise. The principal object of the government departments is to be prepared in case the Belgian postal employees follow the example of the French.
