## Note and Comment

The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada has granted a sanction to the Burlington & Bishop's Association for a ten-mile road race Christmas Day at Burlington. For some years he was rector of St. Joseph's Church, Ottawa, and also became rector of Ottawa College. At the latter institution he gained fame through his ability as a rugby coach. It was under his tuition that Glasgow and other Ottawa Rugbyists received their knowledge of the game. Several years ago Father Fallon was transferred to Buffalo, N.Y., where he became rector of Holy Angels' College, and where he is at present. Bishop-elect Fallon is one of the leading Roman Catholic clergymen in America today, and his legion of old Rugby friends are proud of his well-deserved advancement.

## DEADLOCK CONTINUES ONE BALLOT, EVEN VOTE

Four Ward and Four Brown, Compromise Candidate—Heydler Still in Race.

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—No president of the National League of Professional Baseball Clubs was elected by the club owners in their five-hour session in the Waldorf today; only one ballot was taken, which resulted in four votes each for John M. Ward and Robert W. Brown, a Louisville newspaper man. John Heydler, the present incumbent, refused to allow his name to be presented as a candidate for re-election with a view to clearing the ball, and instead, now Horace Fogel, who represents the new owners of the Philadelphia team, voted for him. The deadlock has continued only in the hope of a compromise candidate, but he, the voters of St. Louis, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh and Boston club owners. After this deadlock, the magnates adjourned until 1 p.m. to-morrow, having done little more than ascertain just how the St. Louis and Philadelphia presidents stood.

The deadlock is similar to that of eight years ago, when four clubs desired the election of A. G. Spalding and four others the continuance of Nicholas.

John Heydler has by no means withdrawn from the presidential race, and his name may later be presented as a candidate. The supporters of Heydler, who are Hermann, Leroy and DeForest, continue to insist that he is the best man for the job, and that he is the only one who is not a politician.
