SIGNATURE WAS FORGED WOULD ANNUAL EFFECTS

Mrs. J. J. Stewart Sues Bank of Montreal—\$250,000 is Involved.

Did Mrs. J. J. Stewart of Toronto understand the position she was putting herself and her husband into when she gave her property as security for loans made to the Maritime Sulphite Company? That is the question on which hangs the result of the case of Stewart v. the Bank of Montreal, in the non-jury sessions.

Mrs. Stewart was left, by her father, the sum of \$200,000 and some real estate. Her husband, James Stewart of Toronto, was president of the Maritime Sulphite Company of Chatham, N.B. This company was organized in 1886 with a capital of \$125,000 and failed in 1901. Mr. Stewart borrowed money from the Bank of Montreal at various times, and he got Mrs. Stewart to sign different agreements and to stand security for him in his business of financing the company. In October, 1903, Mrs. Stewart signed a mortgage in favor of the defendants, and in July, 1904, signed an agreement giving up all her right to certain lands and stocks.

She is now seeking to recover the value of her property on the ground that she was not legally advised in her business dealings. She also claims that the sum owing the bank was only \$125,000, whereas the bank had seized property of hers to the value of \$250,000. If the court decides that the conveyances made by her are not to be set aside she asks that accounts be taken and all over the \$125,000 be returned to her.

Mrs. Stewart was in the witness box for over three hours yesterday, and stood the questioning and cross-questioning remarkably well for a woman so far advanced in years and in such poor health. She was asked if she had been forced to sign the papers by threats and intimidations on the part of the bank against her husband. She had threatened to turn them out of house and home if they did not provide the necessary security, and she had been led to believe that signing of the papers was only to relieve the situation.

Mr. Stewart gave evidence concerning the somewhat complicated business affairs of the Sulphite Company. He had understood, when he had asked his wife to sign the notes, etc., that she would only be liable for the amount of the loans, and not for all her property. He also claimed that the property known as "Inglewood" in Hamilton, which had been lent to him by her father, had been his home till the bank had seized it.

The bank claimed that Mrs. Stewart did receive independent legal advice and that Mr. Stewart was not acting as their agent in getting Mrs. Stewart's signature. They claimed that she was liable for anything he may have done; also that if the agreements signed are void, then the agreement of 1904 is also void, and Mrs. Stewart becomes liable for the original loan to the company. Justice Macbee is on the bench, and J. F. Holmuth is for the plaintiff, and G. F. Shepley, K.C., for the bank. The case continues this morning.

New Labor Paper.
QUEBEC, Nov. 27.—A new weekly paper, to be devoted to the interests of the labor union of the city, is to make its first appearance in Quebec next week.

The damage action to recover \$10,000 brought by Miss Appelle Belland against Dr. R. B. Nevill in the non-jury session court, was continued by Justice Macbee.

Colored Lecturer Declared Hamilton Audience Had Not the Intelligence to Understand.

HAMILTON, Nov. 27.—(Special.)—C. A. Johnson, the colored lecturer and editor of The British Lion, lectured this evening in Green's Hall, on Mars. He said the inhabitants of Mars could walk thru the deepest ocean without getting the tops of their boots wet, and had necks long enough to see into the municipalities.

W. F. Robinson presided, and at the close three groans instead of the customary cheers, were given for the lecturer, who said he understood that his audience did not have the intelligence to comprehend his lecture.

William McNeil, the man who was killed by a street car near the Jockey Club, was a Scotchman, who had arrived here only a short time ago. He had a letter of introduction from John Sneath, 264 West Mill-street, Brantford.

Trudell & Tobey, whose window created such a furore that the street was blocked, were fined \$25 this morning. They will appeal the decision.

Intermediate Championship.
Montreal, champions of the Quebec Union, and the Tigers, champions of the Interprovincial Union, will meet at the Cricket Grounds Saturday to settle the intermediate Dominion championship of Canada.

Thomas Dickie is suing A. W. Ewing for \$3000 damages for injuries received while in Mr. Ewing's employ.

Mayor Stewart, who returned to the city last night, announced to-day that he would not sign the new waterworks bylaw because it wipes out the \$2 charge a year on baths. This would cut \$14,000 off the revenue, and, with the other demands of the city, mean an increase in the tax rate, which he will not countenance. If the aldermen want to reduce the charges on the water supplied to the workmen they should cut down the rate charged on houses less than \$2000 in value by \$1 a year.

The police magistrate this morning committed Joe Goldberg, Wm. Brooks, Henry Westwood and Louis Levy for trial on the charge of stealing wire. Albert Dunsmore, who was arrested with the others, was not tried, but used as a crown witness. The magistrate said the evidence against Goldberg was weak.

William Coy and Miss Emmeline Simmons were married in All Saints' Church to-day. William Sherring was best man.
