STOCKS FEATURELESS ON NEW YORK MARKET

Exchange Opened With Declines Followed by General Tho Irregular Rallies.

WAR GROUP IN STRENGTH ADVANTAGE FOR BULLS

Rails Played Subordinate Part in Saturday's Operations—U. S. Steel Leader.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—No very definite or satisfactory conclusions were to be derived from the week-end session of the market, which began with declines, but made general tho irregular recoveries before the close. The most notable feature of the week-end was the professional favor investment purchases and other constructive factors being deterred by the uncertainty of the first hour were suggestive of bear pressure, especially in Mercantile Marine preferred, and similar active shares.

U. S. Steel and Crucible Steel were again the most conspicuous features, the former ranging within fractional limits, while Crucible rose and fell between 8 1/2 and 8 3/4, closing at 8 3/4, a net loss of 1/4.

Wagon Section Was Only Half Filled, But Baskets Were Well Patronized.

FRESH EGGS PLENTIFUL

New Laid Sold at Forty Cents Per Dozen—Butter Was Slow Sale.

Trade was again slow on the St. Lawrence Market Saturday. The basket section was well patronized, but the wagon section was only about half-filled, which was not all to be wondered at, as it was so cold it was not fit for people to stand in.

New-laid eggs were very plentiful, and the same sold at 45c per dozen, the bulk of the lot, while large quantities were cleared out at 35c and 37c per dozen, and a few at 35c per dozen.

Butter was again slow sale, and ranged all the way from 30c to 35c per lb. one vendor receiving 35c for a small quantity; a few more 37c and 38c, the bulk going at 35c, and quite a large number at 34c, 36c and 38c, while a few had to sell out at 30c.

There were a few bags of potatoes on sale at 2 1/2 per bag; turnips at 40c per bag, and apples at 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 per bushel. There was only one lot of hay brought in Saturday, the prices remaining stationary.
