REACTION IN CORN FOLLOWS ADVANCE

Belief That End of Strike is Near at Hand Causes Heavy Unloading.

Chicago, April 12.—Corn prices underwent a sharp setback at one time today as a result of opinions current in some quarters that the end of the railroad strike was at hand. The market closed nervous at the same as Saturday's finish to 1½c lower, with May \$1.67 to \$1.67½, and July \$1.53½ to \$1.60. Oats lost ½c to 1½c. In provisions the outcome varied from 17c decline to 15c advance.

At first, the corn market showed a decided tendency to climb. Receipts were scanty, and a majority of traders leaned to the view that demoralided traffic conditions would for the time traffic conditions would for the time being prevent any accumulation of stocks. Price bulges that ensued reached in some cases the highest level yet this season. Then, however, word came that President Wilson would appoint a labor board within 24 hours and that vigorous action would be taken to stop interference with the mails. Much commission house selling followed, and prices dropped suddenly. Nevertheless, a good leal of rallying power again developed in the last half hour of the session.

Oats weakened with corn after jumping to new high record figures for the crop.
