CONVENTION STRUGGLES TO PICK PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

SPA CONFERENCE OPENS MOST IMPORTANT EVENT SINCE THE ARMISTICE

Disarmament, Reparations and Trial of War Criminals to Be Definitely Determined—German Chancellor Says They Will Take Loyal Attitude in Discussions.

Spa, July 5.—There was a brief meeting today of the allied and German delegates, who during the next few days will discuss matters relating to the peace treaty.

The session was held in the drawing room of the Villa Fraucuse, and the German delegates, Chancellor Fehrenbach, Dr. Walter Simons, the foreign minister, and Herr Wirth, minister of finance, were seated at the left end of the long horseshoe table, next to the Japanese. There were no introductions or shaking of hands.

The president of the conference, M. Delacroix, the Belgian premier, arose and immediately opened what is considered to be the most important international event since the armistice, by announcing the order of business, which includes disarmament, reparations, coal supply, the trial of Germans accused of atrocities, and the restitution at Danzig.

M. Delacroix inquired of Herr Fehrenbach if he desired to make any observations. The premier of Germany, who was translated by an official interpreter, said: "I desire to say in behalf of the German government, that we have come here to take part loyally in the discussion of how the treaty of peace can be executed."

Mr. Lloyd George, as senior premier, thereupon expressed the gratification of the allied delegates, and Herr Fehrenbach, continued: "I note that the military questions are to be first discussed. We were informed of this last evening and tried to telephone the German minister of war, but reached him too late for him to leave until tomorrow. He will arrive, I think, by tomorrow afternoon."

The three premiers again conferred privately. A few minutes later M. Delacroix announced that the chancellor of England and the French minister of justice would also attend on Thursday for participation in the discussions.

The name of the cruiser has not yet been received.

The type of cruiser available was discussed with Lord Jellicoe, when the cruiser was here some months ago, and it is understood Lord Jellicoe expressed doubt whether it would be possible, in view of the situation, to accept an oil-burner.
