New York, Sept. 4.—Man o' War the winderful three-year-old, set a world's mark in the historical Lawrence Realization Stakes at Belmont Park, when he ran the mile and five-eighths in 2.40 4-5, defeating Hoodwink, his only opposition, about one-eighth of a mile. The fractional time for the Realization was: 23 3-5, .47 4-5, 1.13, 1.38 2-5, 2.03 3-5, 2.40 4-5. The previous world's mark for the distance was held by War. Mint, 2.42 2-5, made at Hurst Park, England, Sept. 26, 1912.

There has been from time to time a lot of discussion as to how far horses stride in races, and, to settle the question, as far as Man o' War is concerned, a representative of the Jockey Club measured one of the colt's mighty bounds after he had gone a mile and a half. From toe to toe, it was exactly twentyfour feet and eight inches. In the earlier flights of the race, no doubt, some of the strides would have been twentyfive feet or more.
