The Toronto storekeepers are due to make their luxury and sales taxes return today and to pay up the sums they have collected for the govern-

ment.
The detailed information for hand ling the returns were received from Ottawa yesterday. The local collector was advised that until complete plans are matured covering the collection and remittance of excise taxes he is to be governed by the following instructions:


