

- 3.—The size of the building; the numbers it can accommodate; and probable amount of the congregation that will usually attend it.
- 4.—The supposed cost of the building; the progress it has made towards completion; and amount of contributions on the spot in money or labor.
- 5.—The frequency and regularity of the proposed services in the Church.
- 6.—That all the sittings are to be free.

It is the wish of the Executive Committee that no Clergyman should, when building a Church, rely upon aid from this Society without first ascertaining whether it is in the power of the Society to grant any assistance.

All grants to Churches are made on the following terms, namely: That the first moiety be called for within one year, and the second within two years from the date of the grant. The first moiety may be obtained when the exterior is finished—the second when the interior is finished.

“The Endowment Sub-Committee receive and hold any money given in trust to the Society for Church purposes, and pay over the annual interest arising from the same, when invested, towards the furtherance of the special object for which it was given.”

With reference to a resolution authorizing the employment of Assistant Missionaries, it was resolved on the 17th August, 1859:

“That no part of the Funds of this Society shall be paid under that Resolution, until the first and each subsequent Quarterly payment of the £50 to be provided by the People in such cases, is actually paid in advance to the Treasurer of the Local Committee.”

“*Resolved*,—That it is the opinion of the Executive Committee, that it is the intention of the fifth Bye-Law that the annual payment of five shillings to the general objects of the Society constitutes a member; but that any person may devote his money to any particular object which is recognised by the Society.”

Form of Legacy.

“I give to the Diocesan Church Society of Nova Scotia the sum of _____, to be applied to the general purposes of the Society.”
And the receipt of the Treasurer of the Society shall be sufficient discharge for the same.

“All donations of Ten Pounds and upwards are funded, and the interest only applied to the general purposes of the Society.”

“The Society will not make its usual grant toward the payment of an Assistant Missionary appointed to a separate cure, unless the people there consent to pay toward the *Endowment Fund of their Parish or Mission*, all the proceeds of whatever glebe lands may be in that parish.”

At a meeting of the Executive Committee, October 19th, 1855, the following resolution was adopted:

“That in future all subscription lists received before the 31st March, in each year, will appear in the next forthcoming report, while those received after that date shall be omitted.”
