Verily, if the "public" puts faith in the report I have quoted from, there will be no more youths sent away to be educated, but our happy shores will be thronged by eager parents from other parts, who, like myself, are in pursuit of "a thorough education" for those entrusted to their care.

I will not further trespass on your columns by particular mention of the other examinations, though the indiscriminate praise of the report demands criticism, but I cannot pass over the school of Mr. Parlee, which must be a "revelation" to any teacher who has not had the advantage of a recent course at the Training School. To him the schools are indebted for an example of system, clearness of illustration, good moral teaching, and a method of drawing out the pupil, instead of cramming him, which I have seldom seen surpassed, and rarely equalled.

In conclusion permit me to say, that I cannot see why the people of Newcastle should be called upon to admire, and to support a teacher who though he may be a "classical scholar," has not, in three years, succeeded in producing one pupil "far enough advanced" to study with a lad educated in Richibucto.
