Money Still Coming In at City Hall, and Total of Dogs Will Like'v Reach 1,500

The number of dog licenses issued this ear is considerably in excess of any preyear is considerably in excess of any previous year. Up to date the total number issued is 1423. Of these more than 100 were double rate \$2 for dogs and \$4 for bitches, owing to the fact that the owners did not get the necessary document until after July I. In the past ten days, as a result of "dog day" at the police court, seventy-five litenses were issued at the \$2 and \$4 rate and a number of those summoned left their license fee at the police court and licenses will be issued later.

The largest number of dogs licensed in any previous year was in 1908 when lay canines were registered. This year's total is likely to be in the vicinity of 1500 as it is said other licenses will have to be taken out after the summonses returnable next Tuesday have been dealt with.

Among the delinquents who called at City Hall this week to get a license was a colored man who, when asked how many dogs he had, replied, one dog and two bitches. When he learned that it would cost him \$10 for their tags of respectability, he quickly decamped without waiting for the license. It is probable he will "give them away" before the second "dog day" comes around.


