### GOLF OUTGROWING ALL OTHER GAMES

Has Become Baseball's Greatest Rival in Canada and United States—Interesting Statistics by Ex-champion

Golf has had such a remarkable growth in the last ten years and the number of new courses is growing at such a wonderful rate that it is difficult to accurately estimate the cost of the game, which is baseball's greatest rival. Jerome Travers, who is in many ways the greatest golfer ever developed in the United States, estimates that there are 1,200 golf clubs in Canada and the United States, with a membership of 800,000. He estimates that the average membership is 250, though many clubs have a much larger membership. Yet, in spite of this remarkable record, four new courses are to be constructed on Long Island this spring.

Champion Travers has compiled some interesting statistics regarding golf. He figures that the average yearly expense for the man who takes up the sport for the first time is about \$180.00. He proportions it as follows: Initiation, \$50; dues, \$50; balls, \$20; clubs, \$17.50; cart fare, \$80; caddies, \$80. With the exception of the initiation fee and dues, this is a reasonable estimate. Travers estimates that the 800,000 golfers will spend \$42,000,000 and that the initiation will be \$17,500,000 a year more. He says that the average average of the 1,200 clubs is 100 acres which is a little higher when the number of nine-hole courses is considered. He places a value of \$600 an acre, or a total valuation of \$72,000,000.

In discussing the cost of upkeep, he figures \$7,500,000, which appears somewhat out of proportion, as most of the nine-hole courses average from \$2,000 to \$3,000, while a few of the eighteen-hole courses will run over \$40,000 a year. He says that the average golfer averaging seven clubs to the bag, is \$6,125,000. Figuring that each player will use an average of one ball a year, he estimates a further outlay of \$875,000 for clubs.

Good Yearly Salary  
Travers believes the average professional earns about \$12,000 a year. This gives a total of \$9,600,000. He says the caddies earn about \$60 a week, or a total of \$31,200,000 a year. He places the value of the golf real estate at \$100,000,000, and says that \$50,000,000 more is spent each year for laborers and caddies. He says that fully 800,000 men and boys are employed by the golf clubs. This estimate would give the following table:

The general total is believed to be within reason. While some of the figures might not be borne out by actual facts, others are too conservative. Certainly no other game in this country has as much money spent on it, and no devotees of a sport spend more money than do the American golfers. In many cases it is a difficult matter to arrive at an actual estimate owing to geographical location or varying conditions. As, for instance, the Stoney Golf Club cost about \$250,000, while a course situated in the country, and no distance from New York, would not cost within 75 per cent. of this amount, owing to the value of real estate. The property of other clubs located nearer New York reaches a much higher figure than that of the Stoney, but the general estimate is probably on the conservative side.
