## MEN OF 55TH SOON TO VALCARTIER

The 55th Battalion has been ordered to Valcartier and will leave St. John in a few days for the big camp in Quebec. Colonel H. H. McLean, brigadier, said last evening that he will join the battalion at Sussex today and proceed with them. The three other battalions of the 5th brigade are already at Valcartier and when the 55th arrives there it will be complete and he will take active command.

A base and recruiting depot will be continued at Sussex and recruits enlisting in this district will be sent there at first. It is possible that they may be kept there for a time to receive their preliminary training but how long they will stay in Sussex before joining the battalion at Valcartier has not been decided yet.

The Methodist men in the battalion were last night entertained at the Methodist church. Several of the officers were present. Rev. H. C. Rice welcomed the men and an enjoyable time was spent. The 25th Overseas Battery of Field Artillery, at Fredericton, under command of Major Randolph Crocker, will leave on Tuesday, July 6th, for Valcartier Camp. On Saturday instructions were received from Halifax to have everything in readiness for the battery to move and yesterday definite word came that July 6th would be the date for the battery to leave Fredericton.

At Valcartier the 55th will join the Brigade of which they are a part and will complete their training there.

Official advice has been received at Woodstock that Corporal Burdette W. Harmon, of the Canadian Engineers with the first Canadian division, has been wounded in the head and arm in the recent fighting in Belgium. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Allison W. Harmon, of Woodstock, and a graduate of U. N. B., having graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1912.

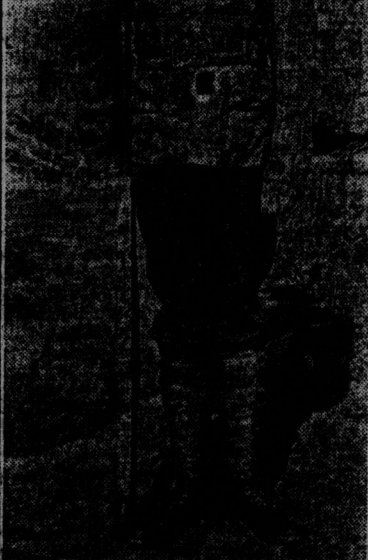

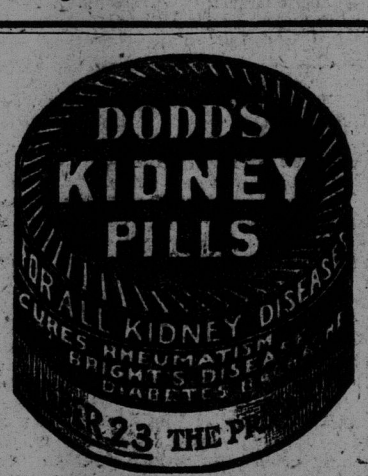

## L. J. SEIDENSTICKER OF REFINERY IN STATEMENT AS TO HIS POSITION

"It is unfortunate at this time that there should be an impression abroad that there is anything foreign in the composition of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries Ltd. I can assure you that there is not. The men behind the directors, are men who have made their money in Canada, whose interests are those of your country and your cause and whose actions should be above suspicion for my self, I do own to an unhappy name but there is nothing German about me but I am an American citizen, my mother was purely English, my sympathies are with the Allies and their cause."  
This statement was made by L. J. Seidensticker, superintendent of the Atlantic Sugar Refinery, at a meeting of the Rotary Club yesterday, in response to congratulatory remarks following his very thorough exposition of the manufacture of sugar as carried on in the big refinery.

He added that it had been found necessary to employ some Germans before the outbreak of war, as most of the available sugar experts were German-Americans. Mr. Seidensticker also referred lightly to the rumors that the refinery was importing gun powder and showed a sample of the bone-black used in purifying the sugar and explained that this was nothing more than a by-product of the refinery which had been mistaken for explosives.  
Another speaker at the club was Rev. W. T. Gunn, D. D., general secretary of the Congregational church in Canada. He urged two features of business and political life, which he appeared had been lacking in Canada. These were to deal cleanly and to deal kindly. Business men had seemed to forget there was another fellow but were looking only for themselves.  
In dealing with his second point, Rev. Gunn urged that the people of Canada should suspend judgment on aliens until their real nationality was known, and their sympathies probed. It had been the intention of the authorities to intern the members of a whole church in Brantford simply because they were Armenians and as such, Turkish subjects. Some German-speaking residents of Calgary had been given the cold shoulder and yet they had come from Russia and their relatives were fighting on our side.  
Commissioner Wigmore presided. T. H. Eatabrooks moved and H. G. May seconded, the vote of thanks to Mr. Seidensticker.

## THE PATRIOTIC FUND IN CITY OF WINNIPEG

When England declared war in August last, the Winnipeg Industrial Bureau, an organization composed of representatives of twenty-eight business bodies of Winnipeg, called a public meeting of citizens the day following the declaration of war, and formulated a plan to aid in war relief work. Thus was born the Patriotic Fund, to which in sixty days following \$800,000 was subscribed. The Winnipeg Patriotic Fund has a double purpose; first, for the relief of soldiers' dependents in Manitoba, and second, for the relief of distress caused by unemployment due to the war.

At a recent meeting reports for the nine months ended May 31 of the Patriotic Fund were submitted. Of the total \$800,000 pledged there has been paid in cash to May 31 the sum of \$600,780. At the present time the Patriotic Fund has the care of 2,179 families, representing a total of more than 10,000 wives, mothers and children.

Married soldiers have left behind. The number of families has increased at the rate of from 200 to 250 for every new battalion mobilizing. The Patriotic Fund executive comprises sixty-five influential men of Winnipeg. Added to this is a working committee of eighty-six women, who have given up practically all their time to the work of investigating and looking after the wants of the soldiers' families and of the families of the unemployed since the war started. Business Principles Followed.

In dealing with the families of the unemployed, these lady visitors after investigating the wants of a family make requests on the finance committee of the Patriotic Fund and are allotted a sum sufficient to relieve any distress existing in that particular family.

In investigating and handling the families of soldiers' dependents, the work is carried on chiefly through the central office, of which Charles F. Roland, commissioner of the Industrial Bureau, is in charge. A soldier's wife has been monthly allowance made direct to her on a given date each month.

The total cost of administration in connection with the patriotic organization up to the present time has been \$4,886, which is 1.27 per cent of the money disbursed. A great deal of voluntary assistance has been furnished by public spirited citizens.

The executive appointed a sub-committee called the approval committee. It meets daily and passes upon all applications received. A subsistence scale, which represents an amount that the approval committee judge sufficient to enable a family to be decently maintained, is carried out in dealing with all soldiers' cases. As an illustration, a wife and two children will receive from the Patriotic Fund \$25 a month. In addition to this the wife receives from the Canadian government her separation al-
