HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 30 - The four-masted German bark Carmen, carrying a cargo of liquor variously estimated at from one to five million siollars, arrived in Halifax yesterday after being the subject of the attentions of the New York authorities, a few days ago, when she was towed in from 140 miles out with the crew suffering

from short rations. Captain Ibbekin had no information to make public regarding his call at this port, and the cargo was at once placed under the supervision of suctoms authorities. The Carmen is no stranger to Halifax, having become a familiar figure in local waters a few years ago as the Marguerite Witte. It is said that the Carmen's crew is largely com-posed of former U-boat sailors and that the supercargo, Carl Becker, is an ex-officer of the German navy.
